The upplement to the act to incorporate a company for the purpose of building a bridge over the North West Branch of Nanticoke river, at a place heretofore called Crotcher's Ferry, but now known and called the Rising Sun, was, on motion by Mr Beckett, referred to the next general assembly.

The surplement to the act, entitled, An act to incorporate the Charitable Marine Society of Baltimore, and the hill for the benefit of Aquilla Beall, of Prince-George's county court, were severally read the se-

cond time, passed, and sent to the senate.

On motion by Alr. Dennis, Leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, An act empowering the judges of elections to administer oaths appertaining to elections. Ordered, That Messrs. Dennis, Lecompt, and Forcest, report the same. Mr. Dennis reports said bill; which was read.

The bill supplementary to the act, entitled, An act to authorise a lottery or lotteries in the city of Bal. timore, and the bill to authorise and empower the levy court of Anne-Arundel county to assess and levy a sum of money for the purposes therein mentioned, were read the second time, parred, and sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Lecompte, the following resolution was read, assented to, and sent to the senate.

An act to withdraw the funds from Washington and Saint-John's Colleges, and subject the same to the appropriation of the legislature, that the attorney general, assisting attorney-general, di trict attorney, or other counsel for the state, who may have the defence of such suits, are hereby instructed and required to appear to such suit or suits on behalf of the state, and bring the same to as speedy a conclusion as possible, in order that the same may be dec'ded upon the true merits of each respective case.

On motion by Mr. H. Hall, the following resolution was read:

Besolved, That the auditor of the state of Maryland be and he is hereby authorised and directed, to make transcripts of the pay rolls of the Maryland troops remaining in the auditor's office. in well bound books, and when so made out, the governor and council are hereby authorised and required to examine the same, and order the treasurer of the western shore to pay to Thomas Karney, auditor, out of any unappropriated money in the treasury, a reasonable compensation for the same

The bill to authorise the sale of the real estate of Henry Simpers, late of Cecil county, deceased, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

The bill for the revolution of real and personal property in Queen-Anne's county, and the bill for the relief of Rufus Eddy, were severally read, passed, and sent to the senate.

The resolution in favour of Mary Thompson, was read the second time and dissented from.

The resolution in favour of William Groves, was read the second time, assented to, and sent to the senate.
