

On motion by Mr. J. B. Eccleston, Ordered, That the bill to alter such parts of the constitution as relates to the manner of altering and changing the constitution and form of government of this state, have a second reading on Tuesday next.

The further supplement to the act, entitled, An act for the erection of a new market-house in Hager's-town, Washington county, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Key, Ordered, That the bill regulating divorces have a second reading on Wednesday next.

Mr. J. P. Kennedy reports a bill, entitled, An additional supplement to an act passed at December session on the 27th day of December in the year of our Lord 1811, entitled, An act to authorise a lottery or letteries in the city of Baltimore, and Mr. T. Williams reports a bill, entitled, An act to prevent horse racing in Cecil county; which were read.

The bill for the benefit of Saint-John's college, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Polk, Ordered, That the bill to alter such parts of the constitution and form of government as directs two delegates to be elected in the city of Baltimore, have a second reading on the 22d instant.

Mr. J. Forrest reports a bill, entitled, An act to alter the names of Nathaniel Mortimer Magruder, Margaret Ellen Magruder, Roderick Magruder, Henry Magruder, and Alaric Magruder, into Nathaniel Mortimer M-Gregor, Margaret Ellen M-Gregor, Roderick M-Gregor, Henry M-Gregor, and Alaric M-Gregor; which was read.

The bill to authorise the collectors of the city and county of Baltimore to complete their collections, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Maulsby presents a petition from sundry inhabitants of Harford county, praying for an act of incorporation for the benefit of The Union Chapel of Harford county; which was read and referred to Messrs. Maulsby, Morris and Alderson.

Mr. Marriott presents a petition from Thomas Karney, auditor general, praying to be authorised to transcribe the pay rolls; which was read and referred to Messrs. Marriott, Duval and Boyle.

On motion by Mr. T. Kennedy, the following resolution was read and assented to:

Resolved, That the clerk of Washington county be and he is hereby released from the payment of nine per cent interest chargeable upon an account due the state against the said clerk, the same having been paid in full on the 17th November 1820, including an interest of six per cent and that the said clerk be also released from the payment of nine per cent interest on an additional account due the state, provided the same be paid in full on or before the first day of October next, with an interest of six per cent.

The additional supplement to the act, entitled, An act to provide for the education of poor children in Kent, Talbot, Cecil, Anne-Arundel, and Montgomery counties. The bill to prevent swine and geese going at large in Middle Town, in Frederick county. The bill to alter the name of Thomas Bond. The supplement to an act passed at December session 1819, relating to the school fund in the several counties therein mentioned. The bill extending the time of taking the sheriff's bond of Cecil county. The bill for the relief of Alexander Prentice, of the city of Baltimore. The bill for the revaluation of the real and personal property of Kent county. The resolution relative to the laws of the state. The resolution relative to the arms belonging to the state. The message appointing a committee on engrossed bills. The bill for the benefit of the sheriff of Allegany county. The supplement to an act authorising a lottery to raise a sum of money for completing an Episcopal Church in Baltimore county. The further supplement to the act, entitled, An act for the distribution of a certain fund for the purpose of establishing free schools in the several counties therein mentioned. The bill to repeal the act, entitled, An act to alter the time of holding the county court in Charles county, passed at December session 1819. The bill to authorise William M Bond, late collector of the second collection district in Harford county, to complete his collection. The bill to authorise Benjamin Richardson, late collector of the third collection district in Harford county, to complete his collection. The bill authorising the sale within the state of a limited number of tickets in the lottery authorised by an act of the legislature of the state of Pennsylvania, entitled, An act to enable George Murray, Gideon Fairman, John Draper, Robert Bald and Thomas Underwood, copartners in the firm of Murray, Fairman & Co. engravers of the city of Philadelphia, to dispose of certain books, maps, plates and prints, by way of lottery; and the bill ceding to the United States the jurisdiction of the state of Maryland in to and over certain lands on North Point and Bodkin Island, at the mouth of the river Patapsco, and for other purposes, were sent to the senate.

The bill authorising Robert Lambdin, of William, late collector of Talbot county, to complete his collection, was read the second time and passed.

The clerk of the senate delivers a communication from the executive, calling the attention of the legislature to the condition of the public buildings, suggesting the propriety of building an armoury, magazine and gun house, and enclosing the annual report of the directors of the penitentiary; and a letter from the president of the Athenæum Institution. On motion by Mr. Marriott, Ordered, That that part relative to repairs of public buildings, and building an armoury, be referred to Messrs. Marriott, Scott, Naylor, W. Eccleston and Reeder.

Also a bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act to incorporate a fire Insurance Company in the city of Baltimore, endorsed "will pass;" which was read. Also the bill annulling the marriage of Walter Williams, and Elizabeth Ann his wife, endorsed "will not pass." The bill for the sale of the real estate of Leonard Covington, deceased, endorsed "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed. The bill to prevent the destruction of oysters, endorsed "will pass with the proposed amendments;" which amendments were read, assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed. The resolution in favour of Benjamin G. Jones, endorsed "dissented from." And the resolution in favour of Jehu Chandler, endorsed "assented to."
