

Resolved, That Henry Darden, one of the securities of William Chambers, against whom the state of Maryland hath obtained judgment in Queen Anne's county court, be indulged from the payment thereof till the first day of December 1821; provided that said judgment, upon which process shall be stayed as aforesaid, shall continue and remain in full force, and execution may issue at any time within twelve months after the expiration of such stay.

On motion by Mr. J. Forrest, the further supplement to an act, entitled, An act to regulate the inspection of tobacco, was referred to the next general assembly.

The supplement to an act to enlarge further the powers of the trustees of the poor of Harford county, and the additional supplement to the act, entitled, An act concerning crimes and punishments, and to regulate the salary of the first keeper, clerk, agent, deputy keepers and guards of the penitentiary, were read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

The amendments proposed to the supplement to the act relative to the mode of staying executions, were read the second time, assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed.

Mr. Marriott delivers the following report:

The committee to whom was referred that part of the executive communication relative to the dilapidated condition of the public buildings at the seat of government, and the propriety of providing by law for the building of an armoury, magazine and gun house at the seat of government, beg leave to report

That they have had the same under their consideration, and have examined the public buildings, and find that they require to be repaired; and it being obvious that the safety of the state house is at all times endangered by the quantity of fixed ammunition which it is found necessary the armourer occasionally should have under his care, and by the attractive influence of so large a mass of steel, beg leave to recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the governor and council be and they are hereby authorised and empowered, to cause the public buildings at the seat of government to be repaired, and that they draw on the treasurer for a sum of money not exceeding _____ dollars.

Resolved, That the governor and council be and they are hereby authorised and empowered to contract for the building of an armoury, magazine and gun house at the seat of government, and that they draw on the treasurer of the western shore for a sum of money not exceeding _____ dollars.

The bill for the relief of Charles Hutchinson, and the bill for the benefit of John Holman, of Washington county, severally endorsed 'will not pass.' and the following messages:
