On motion by Mr J. B. Eccleston, the following resolution was read:

Whereas, it appears from ledger B. in the office of the auditor of the state, that there is a balance of eleven pounds and five shillings due from this state to Edward Wright, of Kent county, as a lieutenant during the revolutionary war; therefore, Resolved, That the treasurer of the western shore pay to Edward Wright, of Kent county, or his order, out of any unappropriated money in the treasury, the sum of eleven pounds and five shillings.

MONDAY, January 29, 1821.

The house met. Present the same members as on Saturday. The proceedings of Saturday were read.

On motion by Mr. Bowles, the following message was read, assented to, and sent to the senate:

Mr. Polk reports a bill, entitled, An act for altering the times of holding the court of appeals. Mr. Edelen reports a bill, entitled, An act to repeal an act, entitled, An act for the better regulation of appeals from the orphans court in this state, and for other purposes. And Mr. Gaither reports a bill, entitled, An act authorising Anthony Kicketts, of Montgomery county, to take from the registers office of said county the original will of Sarah Briscoe, for the purposes therein declared; which were read.

The clerk of the senate delivers the additional supplement to the act, entitled, An act to provide for the education of poor children in Kent, Talbot, Cecil, Anne Arundel and Montgomery counties, endorsed "will pass with the proposed amendments;" which amendments were read, assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed.

Mr. Maulsby presents a memorial from the judges of the election districts No. 1 and 2 in Cecil county, counter to the memorial of George B. Milligan and others; which was read.

Mr. J. P. Kennedy presents a petition from Samuel Sargent praying for a divorce; which was read and referred to messrs. J. P. Kennedy, Barney and Duvall.

Also a petition from Robert Casey, praying that a deed from Isaac Gardner to him may be made valid; which was read and referred to messrs. J. P. Kennedy, Barney and T. Kennedy.

And a petition from Thomas J. Bond, praying he may be authorized to complete the collection of William Hamilton for whom he is security; which was read and referred to messrs. J. P. Kennedy, Showers and Orrick.

Mr. R. Stevens presents a petition from Henry Darden, of Queen Anne's county, praying further indulgence as security for William Chambers and Samuel T. Wright; which was read.

The bill for the relief of John Stemple, of Frederick county, an insolvent debtor, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

The resolution in favour of William Jacobs, was read the second time, assented to, and sent to the senate.

The bill for the benefit of Thomas B. Hall, of Washington county, was read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

Mr. Barney reports a bill, entitled, A further additional supplement to an act, entitled, An act to establish pilots and regulate their fees. Ordered, That the same have a second reading on Thursday next.

And a bill, entitled, An act to confirm and make valid an ordinance of the corporation of the city of Baltimore; which was read.

The supplement to the act to prevent the issuing of small bank notes, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

The resolution in favour of Henry Darden, was read the second time, assented to, and sent to the senate.

The bill for the benefit of the Bank of Caroline; the bill for the benefit of the Conococheague Bank in Williamsport, in Washington county, and the bill for the benefit of the Cumberland Bank of Allegany, were read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

The report in favour of John Glanville, was read the second time, and the question put, That the house assent to the resolution therein contained? The yeas and nays being required appeared as follow:

Resolved in the affirmative and the resolution sent to the senate
