On motion by Mr. Marriott, the 17, 18 and 19th rules, were reconsidered and so amended as to remain as originally reported.

The Speaker laid before the house, a report from the clerk of Baltimore county, relative to the attendance of Judges; read, and referred to the Committee of Grievances and Courts of Justice.

The clerk of the senate delivers the further supplement to the act entitled, An act relating to the public roads in the several counties therein mentioned, endorsed "will pass with the proposed amendment," which amendment was read, assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed.

Mr. Semmes reports a bill entitled, An act establishing the form of the oath of office, and to repeal certain parts of the Constitution and form of Government; which was read.

The committee beg leave further to report, that they have had under their consideration the return of the presiding judges of the election in several of the election districts of Montgomery county, and it appears to your committee by the certificate and return of four of the presiding judges of the election in four election districts in said county, that an election was held on the first Monday in October, eighteen hundred and twenty one, in the districts of said county, distinguished by number one, two, three, four, conformably to the constitution and laws of this state, for four delegates for the General Assembly of Maryland, for said county, in which said certificate and return so made by the said four judges, it appears to your committee that Benjamin S. Forrest, William Darne, John H. Riggs and Benjamin Duvall, Esquires, had the greatest number of legal votes, and are elected. Your committee find that the said four judges have strictly pursued the formula prescribed by law—but it does not appear to your committee, that any election was held in district number five in said county for delegates to the general assembly on the day and year it was held in the other districts.
