Mr Saulsbury presents a petition from Edward Shoebrook, of Caroline county, praying for a pension; read and referred to the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims.

The house adjourns until to morrow morning at 9 o'clock.

WEDNESDAY, December 19, 1821.

The house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill for the benefit of Charles Key Bruce. The bill to authorise Robert Morris, of Talbot county, to bring into this state certain negro slave therein mentioned. The bill for the benefit of James Smith, of Calver county, and the resolution in favor of William Baleman, were sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr Do sey, ORDERED, That the treasurer of the Western Shore, be requested to furnish this house with a statement of the revenue received from taxes on lotteries, and also the amount of the sums paid to the commissioners thereof.

Mr Kennedy presents a petition from Lewis Rodrigues, a native of St. Domingo, praying he may be permitted to practice medicine in Baltimore, read and referred to Messrs Kennedy, J. S. Spence and Sulvane.

Mr Marriott presents a memorial from William S. Green, clerk to Anne Arundel county court, praying he may be authorised to make a general index to the land records of his office; read and referred to Messrs Marriott, Brown and Hughes.

The supplement to the act entitled, An act for the relief of the poor of Caroline county, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

The clerk of the senate delivers a bill entitled, An act for the relief of John Delozier, Sen. of Charles county, endorsed, "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed. The bill to repeal the act authorising certain alterations in Baltimore county and city court rooms endorsed, "will not pass." The resolutions in favor of Elizabeth L. Gassaway and William Moffett, severally endorsed, "assented to." And a communication from his excellency the governor, enclosing the annual report of the board of directors of the Maryland Penitentiary, and sundry resolutions of the legislature of Vermont, on the subject of the appropriation of public lands for the use of schools, which were read and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr Pigman presents a petition from the president, directors and stockholders of the Bank of Westminster, praying for a branch thereof at Frederick town; read and referred to Messrs Pigman, Culver and H. Kemp.

Also a petition from sundry inhabitants of Frederick county, praying for an additional election district; read and referred to Messrs Pigman, Bruce and H. Kemp.

Mr Gabby presents a petition from sundry inhabitants of Washington county, praying for an alteration in the location of the turnpike road from the town of Sharpsburgh, towards Swearingen's Ferry; read and referred to Messrs Gabby, Wever and Bowles.

On motion by Mr King, Leave given to bring in a bill entitled, An act to regulate the pay of the Judges of the Orphans' Court of Somerset county. Ordered, That Messrs King, Dennis and Ballard report the same.

On motion by Mr Nicholson, Leave given to bring in a bill entitled, a further supplement to the act entitled, An act for regulating elections. Ordered, That Messrs Nicholson, Stevens and Moffett, report the same.

Mr Woodward presents a memorial from the commissioners for building a court house in Anne Arundel county, praying a further levy of five thousand dollars to complete the same; read and referred to Messrs Woodward, Carroll, Marriott, Brown and Hughes.

Mr Marriott presents a petition from Louisa Hardesty, of Anne Arundel county, praying for support, read and referred to Messrs Marriott, Carroll and Woodward.

The bill to prevent the erection of booths within two miles of any Methodist camp or quarterly meeting, in Calvert county, and the bill to authorise William Renoe, of Charles county, to remove a certain slave into this state, were read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

Mr Orrick presents a petition from Edward Rider, praying he may hold real property acquired before he was naturalized; read and referred to Messrs Orrick, Snowden and Barney.

Mr Bowles presents a petition from sundry inhabitants of Washington county, praying that the election for district No. 2, may still be held at the cross roads, and not at Williamsport; read and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr Nicholson presents a petition from William Jacobs, of Queen Ann's county, praying compensation for the use of his granery as a place of deposit for arms and camp equipage, &c. during the war; read and referred to Messrs Nicholson, Stevens and Moffett.

Mr Douglass presents a petition from sundry inhabitants of Delaware, praying they may be permitted to catch oysters in Maryland; read and referred to Messrs Douglass, Saulsbury and Lockerman.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill to encourage the destruction of crows in Kent county, and to repeal the act of assembly therein mentioned. The bill to authorise John Aydolotte, of Worcester county, to bring into the State of Maryland his negro slave named Parker. The additional supplement to the act entitled, An act to erect a new market house in Hager's Town, in Washington county, and the bill for the relief of James Williams, the younger, of Caroline county, severally endorsed, "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed.
