TUESDAY, JANUARY 8, 1822.

The house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill providing for the appointment of an attorney general was returned to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Forwood, the following resolution was read.

RESOLVED, That the treasurer of the Western Shore pay to Luther Martin, Esquire, the present attorney general, (once the pride of Maryland, now labouring under providential affliction,) or his order, the sum of three hundred dollars a year, during life, in quarterly payments.

The bill for the relief of the infant children of Levin Campbell, late of Dorchester county, and the bill to make valid a deed therein mentioned, were read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

Mr Wyatt reports a bill entitled, An act to incorporate the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of Maryland, and Mr Dorsey reports a bill entitled, An act to authorise Christian Kemp, as guardian of Virginia Baker and Corbin Baker of Frederick county, to remove into this state from the state of Virginia certain negroes therein mentioned; which were read.

The supplement to the act entitled, An act to establish a bank and incorporate a company to be styled the Bank of Westminster, was read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Woodward, ORDERED, That the bill to authorise the levy court of Anne Arundel county to levy a sum of money for the purpose of enclosing the court house, be recommitted.

Mr Orrick presents a petition from sundry inhabitants of Baltimore county, praying certain roads therein mentioned may be made public roads; read and referred to Messrs Orrick, Forwood, Barney, Snowden and Whiteford.

Mr. Marriot presents a petition from Lieutenant William D. Davidson, praying he may be permitted to bring a slave into this state; read and referred to Messrs Marriot, Hughes and Carroll.

Mr Harris reports a bill entitled, A supplement to an act entitled, an act for the improvement of the public roads in Kent county; which was read.

Mr Loockerman delivers the following report:

The committee to whom was referred the petition of the trustees of the poor of Talbot county, beg leave to report, That the prayer of the petitioners ought not to be granted, and that they have leave to withdraw their petition.

Which was read and concurred with.

The bill relative to the making of a public landing place and road in Somerset county, was read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

The bill for the inspection of ground black oak bark, was read the second time, amended, passed and sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Forwood, the bill relative to the school fund for Harford county, was recommitted for amendment.

Mr Forwood reports said bill as amended, which was twice read, passed and sent to the senate.

The bill for the relief of James C. Wheeler, of Talbot county, was read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

Mr Bowles reports a bill entitled, An act authorising the levy court of Washington county to appoint commissioners to divide said county into seven election districts, and for other purposes; which was read.

Mr. Hughes delivers a petition from Elizabeth Isabel; which was read and referred to the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims.

The bill for the relief of Benjamin Roberts, of Talbot county, was read the second time, and will not pass.

Mr Orrick reports a bill entitled, A supplement to the act entitled, an act for the benefit of the trustees of the Garrison Forrest academy, and the Franklin academy, in Baltimore county; which was read.

Mr Sollars presents a petition from sundry inhabitants of Calvert county, praying for a law to authorise the establishment of patrols in said county; read and referred to Messrs Sollars, Duns, M-ple and B. S. Forrest.

The bill for the benefit of Peter Tingstrom, of Frederick county; the bill to encourage the destruction of crows in Calvert county, and the supplement to the act entitled, An act for the distribution of a certain fund for the purpose of establishing free schools in the several counties therein mentioned, were read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

The clerk of the senate delivers the resolution in favor of William Jacobs, and the resolution in favor of Thomas Post, severally endorsed, "assented to."

The house according to the order of the day proceeded to the election of a director on the part of the state. On motion by Mr. Barney, ORDERED, That John S. Skinner be considered as elected director on the part of this house in the Bank of Baltimore.

The house according to the order of the day proceeded to the second reading of the bill establishing the oath of office, and to repeal certain parts of the constitution and form of government.

Mr. B. S. Forrest moved to withdraw the same from the hands of the chair, for the purpose of offering an amendment and after some time spent in debating the bill,
