Abraham Shriver has repaired to this place, and has communicated in his memorial to this house "that he is ready and anxious to meet without delay longer than is essential to the ends of instice," the said charge touching his official conduct; and as at the late period of the session, it is problematical if the Committee of Grievances and Courts of Justice can make the enquiry imposed on them by the order of this house, in time for a final disposition thereof, during the present session, and as it is essential for public justice and the character of the Judge, that the investigation of his conduct shall not be delayed, therefore, ORDERED, That this house will proceed to hear evi, dence in relation thereto, and that the Committee of Grievances and Courts of Justice cause such persons to be subpensed as they shall deem expedient to have examined in relation to the official conduct of the Judge, and to ascertain if he has so misdemeaned himself in his office of Judge, as to require that this house shall address the Governor, requiring him to remove said Shriver from his office of Judge.
