

city of Baltimore, endorsed, "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed. The bill to make valid a deed therein mentioned, and the bill appointing commissioners for the regulation and improvement of the village of Hillborough, in Caroline county, severally endorsed, "will not pass." And the bill to regulate the pay of the justices of the orphans' courts of the several counties therein mentioned, endorsed, "will pass with the proposed amendments;" which amendments were read.

Mr. Bruce reports a bill entitled, An act to authorise the president and managers of the Hagerstown turnpike road company, to raise a sum of money by lottery, for the purpose therein mentioned. Mr. Edelen reports a bill entitled, A further supplement to the act entitled, An act authorising a lottery to raise a sum of money to build a church in Charles county, passed at November session 1807. Mr. H. Kemp reports a bill entitled, An act to authorise the president and managers of the Westminster, Taney Town and Emmitsburg turnpike road company, to raise a sum of money by lottery for the purposes therein mentioned; and Mr. Dorsey reports a bill entitled, An additional supplement to an act entitled, An act relating to negroes, and to repeal the acts of assembly therein mentioned; which were severally read.

The bill authorising the appointment of an agent, was read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Stevens, the following message was read, assented to, and sent to the senate,

Gentlemen of the Senate,

Being under an impression that the business before us can be acted on by the 16th day of this inst. we propose therefore with the concurrence of your honorable body to close the session on that day.

On motion by Mr. Meconekin, the following resolution was read:

RESOLVED, That no person now on the pension list of this state, shall be continued thereon, or paid any pension after the first day of October next, unless, on or before said day, said pensioner shall produce to the treasurer of the western shore a certificate from the judges of the county court where such pensioner resides, or some one judge of said court, that said court or judge is well satisfied from examination made, that such pensioner is not worth; and to which certificate shall be affixed the county court seal and declaration of the clerk, shewing the said judge to be duly commissioned and sworn, or the same to be the act of the court.

On motion by Mr. Nabb, ORDERED That in addition to the present hours of sitting, this house will sit for the dispatch of local business and no other, from 6 o'clock, P. M. till 9 o'clock, P. M.

The bill appointing commissioners to settle the divisional line between Harford and Cecil counties, was read the second time. On motion by Mr. Williams, the question was put, That the same be referred to the next general assembly? Resolved in the affirmative.

The house resumed the consideration of the bill relative to the inspection of flour, and the question was put, on striking out the first section? Determined in the negative.

On motion by Mr. Barney, the question was put, That the words "the mayor," be stricken out of the section giving him the power to appoint one of the persons to hear appeals? Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Loockerman, the question was put, That the same be referred to the next general assembly? Determined in the negative.

On motion by Mr. Barney, the question was put, That the words "in all respects comply with the ordinances of the mayor and city council of Baltimore, now made and in force, or that may hereafter be made, regulating the inspection of flour, and not inconsistent with this law, shall, as such, be" be stricken out of the third section preceding the oath of office? Determined in the negative.

On motion by Mr. Pigman the question was put, That the following be added to the said bill to wit: *And be it enacted*, That in case of the death, resignation, disqualification or removal of an inspector from the city of Baltimore, to be appointed under this law, the governor of this state by and with the advice and consent of the council, shall fill up the vacancy; and the person or persons appointed to fill up the vacancy, shall continue to serve during the balance of the year, and all laws inconsistent with this law, are hereby repealed. Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Dorsey, the following was added to the same: *And be it enacted*, That the governor, by and with the consent of the council, shall have full power and authority to remove any inspector appointed by virtue of this law, whenever they shall deem the same consistent with the public interest.

And be it enacted, That upon the sickness or disability of any inspector appointed by virtue of this law, the mayor of the city shall appoint one to officiate as inspector during such sickness, until the appointment by the governor and council of an inspector in the place of such inspector so sick or disabled.

The question was then put, Shall the said bill pass? The yeas and nays being required, appeared as follow:
