Messrs and are appointed by this house to join such gentlemen as may be named by you to count the ballots and report thereon.

On motion by Mr Dorsey, Leave given to bring in a bill entitled, An act relating to the payment of pensions granted by this state. Ordered, That Messrs Dorsey, Moffett and King, report the same. Mr Dorsey reports said bill; which was read.

The bill for the benefit of the First Independent church of Baltimore, was read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

Mr Nabb reports a bill entitled, An act authorising a lottery to raise a sum of money for completing a church and academy in Baltimore county; which was read.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill to abolish survivorship in joint tenancy; endorsed, "will not pass." The bill to incorporate the president and commissioners of the town of Elkton, and declare their powers, endorsed, "will pass with the proposed amendments;" which amendments were read, assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed. The bill for the benefit of William K. Austin, of Talbot county, was read the second time, passed and sent to the senate. The bill for the relief of the poor of Worcester county, being supplementary to the act entitled, An act for the relief of the poor of the several counties of this state, was read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr Craig, Leave given to bring in a bill entitled, An act to prevent the introduction of the yellow or malignant fever in the city of Baltimore. Ordered, That Messrs Craig, Williams and Norris, report the same.

On the second reading of the bill to alter and amend the constitution, so that members of the state senate may be hereafter elected immediately by the people—On motion by Mr Carroll, the question was put, That the same be referred to the next general assembly? Determined in the negative.

On motion by Mr Hughes, that the whole of the bill be stricken out? The previous question was called for by Mr Stevens and put—That is, Shall the main question be now put? Determined in the negative. And after debating the same, the main question was then put on striking out? The yeas and nays being required, appeared as follow:
