

On motion by Mr Forwood that the words "by law existed prior to the passage of this act," be stricken out for the purpose of inserting the words, "the examiners are entitled to by this act."— A division was called for and put on striking out. Determined in the negative. The question was then put on the substitute, which was passed and sent to the senate.

The clerk of the senate delivers the further supplement to the act entitled, An act regulating the inspection of tobacco, endorsed, "amendment to the amendments assented to." Ordered to be engrossed. The bill for the benefit of Washington Lodge, No. 3, in the city of Baltimore, endorsed "will pass with the proposed amendments;" which amendments were read, assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed. The bill to authorize the orphans' court of Montgomery county to appoint a trustee to convey the lands of the heirs of John A. Brown to Joseph Neale, endorsed "will pass;" ordered to be engrossed. Also, a bill entitled, An act to relinquish the right of the state to certain lands therein mentioned, endorsed "will pass;" which was read the first and second time by special order, passed and returned to the senate. Also the bill to impose and collect a tax upon the estates of deceased persons. The bill for the relief of Joseph E. Bentley and Joseph Delaplaine. The bill to authorize a lottery to raise a sum of money for the purpose of building a church for the use of the Lutherans and Presbyterians in the neighborhood of Alquiers. The bill to authorize the president and managers of the Westminster, Taneytown and Emmitsburg turnpike road company to raise a sum of money by lottery for the purposes therein mentioned. The further additional supplement to an act to authorize Richard Tilghman and others to raise by lottery a sum of money for the purposes therein mentioned, passed at December session, 1798. The bill to authorize a lottery or lotteries to raise a sum of money for the purpose of cutting and opening a canal from the head of Blackwater river into the head of Parsons' creek. The bill to authorize the congregation of the German Reformed church in Middletown to raise a sum of money by lottery. The bill to authorize a lottery to raise a sum of money for the payment of the debts incurred in finishing the church and school house in Boonsborough. The further supplement to the act authorizing a lottery to raise a sum of money to build a church in Charles county. The bill for authorizing a lottery for the Rockville and Barnes' town Roman Catholic congregation. The bill for the benefit of the First Independent church of Baltimore. The bill to authorize the president and managers of the Boonsborough Turnpike Road Company to raise by lottery a sum of money. The bill to authorize a lottery for the benefit of the Union church of Taneytown, in Frederick county. The bill authorizing a lottery to build a Presbyterian church in Elkton. The bill for the relief of the stockholders of the Susquehanna bridge. The bill to authorize a lottery for the purpose of raising a sum of money to pave the streets of Bell-Air. The bill to authorize a lottery for the benefit of Saint Lucis Reformed Church, at Uniontown. The supplement to the act to prohibit sheriffs from receiving negro slaves into the public jails of this state, except by due course of law. The bill to incorporate the trustees of the Chesapeake Academy, and the bill to give validity and operation to the deed of conveyance therein mentioned, severally endorsed, "will not pass." The resolutions in favor of John Williams, Gilbert Middleton and Mark Goldsborough, severally endorsed, "dissented from."

Mr Showers delivers the following report:

The committee to whom was referred the petitions of sundry inhabitants of the third election district of Baltimore county, praying the removal of the place of holding the elections in said district, having had the same under their consideration, beg leave to report, that in as much as a law has passed this legislature the present session, appointing commissioners to lay out Baltimore county into new and more election districts they are of opinion that it is inexpedient at this time for the legislature to interpose any further on the subject—Therefore recommend that the petitioners have leave to withdraw their petition.
