

a road leading from Bean Town in Charles county, to Mattawoman swamp, between the plantations of Theodore Dyer and Eleanor Townsend, where the said swamp divides Charles and Prince George's counties, and the bill relating to coroners were read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

The clerk of the senate delivers the supplement to the act laying duties on licenses to retailers of dry goods and for other purposes; the bill to repeal an act of assembly therein mentioned; the bill licensing certain dealers in lottery tickets and others, endorsed, "will not pass." The resolution in favor of Benjamin Tickle, endorsed, "dis-sented from." And the following message:

BY THE SENATE, February 22, 1822

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

The senate return you the bill entitled, An act taxing or licensing certain dealers in lottery tickets and others, rejected, because they are of opinion that the amount to be paid for the license in the city of Baltimore is not as much as it should be. The senate think that it may be raised to two hundred dollars. They also think that the tax on the license obtained elsewhere than in the city of Baltimore, may be raised to fifty dollars. The senate would respectfully suggest to your honorable body the above alterations in this bill. The senate have also rejected the bill entitled, A supplement to the act laying duties on licenses to retailers of dry goods and for other purposes, because they are of opinion that the license of the wholesale importer may be put at fifty dollars instead of twenty dollars, as provided by this bill. They are also of opinion that the word "&c." in the second line of the first section should be stricken out, and that before the word "liquors," in the second line and section, there ought to be inserted the words "of wine, rum, brandy, whiskey, and other distilled spiritous," so as to tax only the wholesale dealer for vending the same sort of liquors as the retail dealer is taxed for. This perhaps would not be the case if the amendment suggested was not made. The senate would therefore respectfully suggest to your honorable body the propriety of making these alterations in this bill.

The bill to empower the levy court of Calvert county to establish patrols in said county, was referred to the next general assembly.

On motion by Mr Bowles, Leave given to bring in a bill entitled, An act for the payment of the journal of accounts. Ordered, That the committee on claims report the same.

The supplement to an act entitled, An act laying duties on licenses to retailers of dry goods, and for other purposes, was postponed until to-morrow.

The bill for the benefit of the town of Hvre de Grace; the bill authorising George Braston, of Cecil county, to bring into this state from the state of Delaware, a negro boy therein mentioned; the bill repealing an act entitled, An act for the relief of Edward Godman, of Montgomery county, were read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

The resolution in favor of William Canon, was read the second time and dissented from.

The bill for the relief of Fielding A. Furness, of the city of Baltimore, was read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

Mr Bowles delivers the bill entitled, An act for the payment of the journal of accounts; which was read.

The bill for the benefit of the rector of Saint John's parish in Harford and Baltimore counties, was read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

The bill for the relief of Sophia Brighly of Frederick county, and the further supplement to the act entitled, An act for the preservation of the breed of fish, were read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

The bill for the relief of Richard Bennet Mitchel, of the city of Baltimore, was read the second time, passed and sent to the senate.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill to incorporate the Savage Manufacturing company; the bill for the benefit of William Harness; the bill authorising a loan of one hundred thousand dollars; the further supplement to an act entitled, An act for the appointment of commissioners for the regulation and improvement of Cambridge, in Dorchester county, and to establish and regulate a market in said town, and the bill authorising the laying off ground and extending thereon the public wharf at New town, in Worcester county, severally endorsed, "will pass;" ordered to be engrossed. The bill authorising a loan, and the bill authorising John Murray of Baltimore county, to collect the damages allowed to him for the extension of Aisquith street through his ground, endorsed, "will not pass." The bill relating to coroners, endorsed, "will pass with the proposed amendments;" which amendments were read. The additional supplement to an act for the better regulation of the militia of the city of Baltimore, endorsed, "will pass with the proposed amendments;" which amendments were read, assented to and the bill ordered to be engrossed. And the following message:

BY THE SENATE, February 22, 1822.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

We return you the resolutions relative to the school fund for Prince George's county, in the hope that upon re-consideration, your honorable body will consent to adopt them. It will be seen by the treasurer's report, that Prince George's county has now idle and unproductive in the treasury, upwards of \$1,700. The senate cannot perceive that any reasonable objection can be made to this mode of providing for the school fund a safe and profitable investment. Whenever it shall be thought advisable to apply this fund to education, there can be no difficulty in effecting it, as the duration of the loan depends upon the will of the legislature. By order, WM.
