The bill to alter, and strike out certain words in an act entitled, An act to alter and change the constitution, as relates to the division of Anne Arundel county into election districts; the bill to alter the constitution relative to the qualification of voters in the city of Baltimore; and the bill to regulate the removal of certain civil cases from one county to another, were severally read the second time and will not pass, and returned to the senate.

The clerk of the senate delivers the resolution in favor of the Potomac company, endorsed "dis-sented from;" the resolution rescinding the resolution in favor of Joshua Rutledge, endorsed "assented to;" the bill relating to the removal of criminal causes in Baltimore city and county courts; the supplement to the act laying duties on licenses to retailers of dry goods and for other purposes; the supplement to an act entitled, An act to provide a revenue for the support of the government of this state; and the bill licensing certain dealers in lottery tickets, and others, severally endorsed "will pass;" ordered to be engrossed; the resolution rescinding a resolution in favor of Joseph Cresap, and the resolution in favor of W. M. Huhne and Co endorsed "assented to;" the resolution in favor of Luther Martin, endorsed "assented to with the proposed amendments;" which amendments were read and assented to; and the following message:
