On motion by Mr. Steele, leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, An act authorising the appointment of a trust for the sale of the remainder of the Nanticoke Indian lands in Dorchester county. Ordered, that Messrs. Steele, Byus and Hooper report the same.

On motion by Mr. J. P. Kennedy, the following resolution was read:

Resolved, That the treasurer of the Western Shore be, and he is hereby authorised, to pay to Doct. Colen M'Kenzie, the survivor of Doct. James Smyth, or his order, out of any unappropriated money in the treasury, the fourth instalment of the loan authorised to be negotiated by them on the credit of the state, by a resolution of the general assembly for improving the Hospital, which becomes due on the present year.

Mr. Steele presents a petition from the president and directors of the Nanticoke Bridge Company, praying they may be vested with a right in one acre of marsh land adjoining said bridge; read and referred to Messrs. Steele, Dennis, Hooper, Teackle and Jones.

Mr. Wootten presents a petition from sundry inhabitants of Prince George's county, praying that an old road through the land of Doct. Macgill and Mr. Ogle, may be opened; read and referred to Messrs. Wootton, Semmes and Culver.

Mr. Spence presents a petition from the trustees of the Salisbury academy, and others, praying for a donation; read and referred to Messrs. Spence, Franklin, Dennis, Jones, Slemaker, Teackle and Riley.

On motion by Mr. Massey, leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, An act to make valid a deed therein mentioned. Ordered, that Messrs. Massey, Ireland and Hodges report the same.

On motion by Mr. Millard, the following order was read:

Ordered, That the different committees report to this house the result of their deliberations by the 25th of this month, as it is to be hoped the legislature will not sit long after that period.

Mr. Drury presents a petition from the congregation of Saint Paul's Church in Sharpsburgh, praying for a lottery; read and referred to Messrs. Drury, Keller and T. Kennedy.

Mr. Chauncey presents a petition from sundry inhabitants of Harford county, relative to a road; read and referred to Messrs. Chauncey, Whiteford and Allen.

The bill for the benefit of the heirs of Jesse Wainwright, and the bill for the relief George Yeaman, were read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Semmes reports a bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of Anthony Addison and Henry A. Callis; and Mr. Thomas reports a bill, entitled, An act to restrain and punish trespassers; which were read.

Mr. J. P. Kennedy presents a petition from Stanley Robinson; read and referred to the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill to reduce the per diem of the justices of the orphans' court of Anne-Arundel county, endorsed, "will not pass." The resolution in favor of Roger Hooper, endorsed, "assented to." And a communication from the executive, inclosing the annual report of the directors of the penitentiary, and a certificate from the president of the Farmers' and Merchants' Bank, of their acceptance of the renewal of their charter on the terms prescribed by law; which were read.

The supplement to the act, entitled, An act to make public the proceedings of the levy courts in the several counties in this state, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

The supplement to the act, entitled, An act to provide for the recording of certain deeds, and other purposes, was read the second time, passed, and returned to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Edelen, leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, An act to authorise the county clerks of this state, to judge and approve of securities in cases therein mentioned. Ordered, that Messrs. Edelen, Semmes and Garner report the same.

Mr. Johnson reports a bill, entitled, An act to regulate a dangerous practice in the stone quarries on the falls turnpike road near Baltimore; which was read.
