The House met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

On motion by Mr. Teackle, the bill to provide for the public instruction of youth throughout this state, and to promote important interests of husbandry and manufactures, was reconsidered and ordered to have a second reading on the 15th inst.

Ordered, That the bill relative to the Delaware canal, have a second reading on Friday next.

On motion by Mr. Semmes, leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of Col. Roger Jones, of the United States army; Ordered, that Messrs. Semmes, Keller and Estep, report the same.

On motion by Mr. Steele, the following message was read, assented to, and sent to the senate, with the bill therein mentioned.

Mr. Norris presents a petition from Bennet Barnes, Christian Hoffman, and others, of Harford county, praying the interposition of the legislature relative to an ordinance passed by the city council of Baltimore regulating the inspection of salted fish; read and referred to Messrs. Norris, Cosden and Allen.

Mr. A. Lee presents a petition from Obadiah Gray, of Montgomery county, praying for support; read and referred to Messrs. A. Lee, Duvall and Williams.

On motion by Mr. Gerry, the following message was read:

Gentlemen of the Senate.—We propose with your concurrence, to close the present session of the legislature on the 19th inst. as we believe all the necessary business before us, can be transacted by that time.

On motion by Mr. T. Kennedy, the words "the 19th" was stricken out; after unsuccessful motions to fill the blank up with "the 25th" and "the 23rd" the same was filled up with the 22nd.

On motion by Mr. Millard, that the whole be stricken out from the words "Gentlemen of the Senate," for the purpose of inserting the message proposed by him on the 27th January; a division of the question was called for and put on striking out? Determined in the negative. The message was then assented to, and sent to the senate.

The clerk of the senate delivers the further supplement to an act, entitled, An act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road to lead from the cross roads near Richard Caton's, lime kiln, in Baltimore county, nearly in the direction of Jones' Falls, to the city of Baltimore; endorsed "will pass with the proposed amendment;" which amendment was read.

The bill relating to the landing place on the north west branch of Nanticocke river, endorsed "will pass with the proposed amendments;" which amendments were read, assented to, and the bill ordered to engrossed.

The bill for the relief of the securities of Thomas Bailey, former collector of the tax, for Baltimore county and city; and the supplement to an act respecting certain land certificates, endorsed "will pass;" ordered to be engrossed.

The supplement to the act, entitled, An act for the relief of the Cumberland bank of Allegany; the bill for the relief of Eleanor Banks, of the city of Baltimore; the bill for the relief of Charity F. Barriere, of the city of Baltimore; and the bill to permit John Piet, of the city of Baltimore, to bring certain negroes from Virginia into this state, severally endorsed "will not pass."

A bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act to carry into execution, a resolve of the Congress of the United States, respecting the safe keeping of persons committed under the authority of the United States, to goals of this state, endorsed "will pass;" which was read; And the resolution in favor of the collectors of the tax, endorsed "assented to."

The bill to prohibit more than one judgment, for the cost of one suit being entered on any bond or note, was read the second time.

On motion by Mr. J. P. Kennedy, the question was put, that the same be referred to the next general assembly? Determined in the negative.
