

VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS

BY THE SENATE, February 22, 1823.

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates—The senate have rejected the resolution in favor of Zachariah Roberts of the city of Baltimore, as they understand his situation is such, that the money given by it could not with propriety be paid to him. If you provide for its payment to some one else in Baltimore for his use, the senate will accede to it.

The supplement to the act, entitled, An act to carry into execution a resolve of the Congress of the United States, respecting the safe keeping of persons committed under the authority of the United States to gaols or this state; and the supplement to act, entitled, An act to quiet possessions, and prevent suits at law, passed at December session 1818, chapter 90, were passed and sent to the senate.

The bill relating to Baltimore city court, was read the second time and will not pass.

On motion by Mr. John P. Kennedy, the following message and resolution were read, assented to, and sent to the senate:

Gentlemen of the Senate—We have received your message relative to the pension for Zachariah Roberts, and in conformity to the suggestion you have made, we return you a resolution proposing to vest his pension in Peter Levering, of the city of Baltimore, as a trustee.

Resolved, That the treasurer of the western shore pay to Peter Levering of the city of Baltimore, or to his order, annually, and in case of his death, to his executors, in quarterly payment, the half pay of a corporal, for the support and maintenance of Zachariah Roberts, during his life, as a compensation for services rendered in the revolutionary war.

On motion by Mr. Estep, the following message was read, assented to, and with the resolution sent to the senate:

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, February 24, 1823.

Gentlemen of the Senate—We return to your house the resolution in favor of James Ruark, and hope upon reconsideration you will pass the same, as the applicant is extremely old and very poor, and well deserving the benevolence and charity of the legislature as an old revolutionary soldier.

The bill to repeal the act for licensing and regulating ordinary keepers, and for other purposes, was passed and sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Archibald Lee, the following message and resolution were read, assented to, and sent to the senate:

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, February 24, 1823.

Gentlemen of the Senate—We have received your dissent to the resolution we sent you in favor of Richard Kisby. We cannot but hope that you will reconsider this resolution, as we are at a loss to conceive a stronger claim upon the equity of the legislature, than that presented by a faithful old revolutionary soldier, whose wounds received in the defence of those liberties we are now enjoying, are at this moment bleeding a fresh, and uniting with his gray hairs, and faithful services in this appeal to your justice and clemency.

If there be any doubts of the improper use of this pension, we beg leave to propose, that it be placed under the care of a trustee, to be paid for his support, as this individual is totally incapable of obtaining his livelihood without aid, and we cannot believe it your intention to burthen counties with the support of infirm revolutionary wounded soldiers.

BY THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES, February 24, 1823.

Resolved, That the treasurer of the western shore pay to Solomon Holland, register of Montgomery county, or to his order, or to his successor, annually, a sum of money equal to the half pay of a private, for the use and support of Richard Kisby, as a remuneration for his services during the revolutionary war, which said sum, when paid to the said Solomon Holland, or his order, or to the order of his successor, shall be applied to the support and maintenance of the said Richard Kisby.

On motion by Mr. Estep, the following resolution was read:

Resolved, That the treasurer of the western shore be and he is hereby directed, to pay to the president of the senate and speaker of the house of delegates, each \$5 per day, and to each of the other members of the legislature, clerks, and other officers, at the rate of \$4 per day, for their attendance since the journal of accounts was closed, and that the committee of claims furnish the treasurer with a list of all the attending members, clerks, and other officers.

On motion by Mr. Thomas, the following resolution was read:

Resolved, That the treasurer of the western shore pay to Thomas E. Hambleton, engrossing clerk, the sum of — dollars, for his extra services this session.

After introducing the names of the other committee clerks, the same was rejected.

On the second reading of the resolution relative to furnishing the government house Mr. Millard moved to fill up the blank with \$1000? The yeas and nays being required, appeared as follows:
