

On motion by Mr. W. G. D. Worthington, ordered that the resolutions respecting the cause of the Greeks, the South Americans, and the policy of the Allied Powers of Europe; which were made the order of the day for to-day; as also, those from the Senate on similar subjects, be made the order of the day for the first Monday of January next.

On motion by Mr. W. Stewart, he was excused from being on the committee appointed on the petition of the President and Directors of the Commercial and Farmers' Bank, and Mr. W. G. D. Worthington appointed in his place.

On motion by Mr. Pitt, leave given to bring in a bill entitled an act, to alter all such parts of the constitution and form of government, as relate to the manner of altering and amending the constitution of this state; ordered that Messrs. Pitt, Johnson, Loockerman, Semmes and Boon report the same.

Mr. Bratton reports a bill entitled an act to alter the time of holding the county courts in the several counties therein mentioned, which was twice read by special order, passed and sent to the Senate.

The resolution in favor of Elizabeth Spalding, was read the second time passed and sent to the Senate.

On motion by Mr. Henderson, the message proposed by Mr. Pitt yesterday was re-considered.

On motion by Mr. Nicholson, the word "cannot" was stricken thereout.

The question was then put, that the house assent to the same.

Resolved in the affirmative, and the message sent to the Senate.

The clerk of the council delivers a communication from the executive, relative to arms and munitions of war; read and referred to the committee appointed to report a bill regulating the militia.

The clerk of the Senate delivers the bill authorising and requiring the Levy Court of Frederick county, to provide a suitable room for holding the orphans' court of said county, and safe keeping of the records and papers of said court, endorsed, will pass, ordered to be engrossed. And the resolution relative to the payment of accounts, endorsed assented to.

On motion by Mr. Merrick, leave given to bring in a bill, entitled an act, supplementary to the act, entitled an act, concerning the judgments and judicial proceedings of the courts of justice in this State, and to provide for the completion of the records in certain cases; ordered that Messrs. Merrick, Kemp and Hopper report the same.

Mr. Franklin reports a bill, entitled an act for the benefit of Stephen Purnell, of Worcester county.

Mr. Riley reports a bill for the relief of Elizabeth Waters, of Worcester county. And

Mr. Wm. Stewart reports a bill, entitled a supplement to an act, relating to the Levy Court of Baltimore county.

The report of the committee of elections, was read the second time.

On motion by Mr. Dennis, the question was put, that that part of the report relative to the petition of Littleton D. Teackle, Esq. from the words "they requested" to the words "have been adduced" inclusive, be expunged from the journal. The decision not being unanimous, Mr. Hughes moved, and the question was put, that the same words be stricken out of the report.—Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion by Mr. Edelen all that part of the report relative to instituting suits against the clerks of the several counties, was stricken out, and the report then concurred with.

On motion by Mr. Fenwick, the following resolutions were read:

The Legislature of Maryland view with just pride and satisfaction, the able and efficient administration of the General Government in all its various departments, and repose entire confidence in the wisdom, virtue and ability of the Executive both as to the internal and external relations of this nation.

They reciprocate the magnanimous feeling and applause the firm and decided stand which the Chief Magistrate has taken in his late Message to the Congress of the United States, against the arrogant and despotic pretensions of the Allied Sovereigns of Europe, in attempting to interpose their authority by force in the internal concerns of independent nations, and more especially their menace to subjugate our sister republics of South America and Mexico beneath the power and dominion of the faithless Ferdinand.

They can but view all such unholy coalitions, against the liberty and independance of any and every people with indignation and abhorrence—First, as it tends to establish the odious doctrine of foreign intervention and control, thereby subverting the principle of self-government, the true basis of real liberty—Secondly, as it evinces the disposition and intention of those self-styled legitimates to subject the human race to their uncontrolled dominion and to establish the Divine right of kings over the will of the people and representative government.—And lastly, as it serves as
