The committee to whom was referred the petition of sundry inhabitants of Saint Mary's county, praying that a company may be incorporated to make a turnpike road from the Great Mill in Saint Mary's county, to the lower bridge over the Eastern Branch of the Potomac, beg leave to report, that they have had the same under their consideration, and would prefer a postponement of it as it is likely congress will take up the subject this session of establishing naval depots at some point on the Patuxent, and on Saint Mary's river, in Saint Mary's county where there were during the last year surveys made by an act of congress; and in the event of the establishment of naval depots aforesaid, it might be important to the inhabitants of St. Mary's, that a different route should be laid out; which was assented to.

The report in favor of William Bateman, was read the second time, the resolution assented to and sent to the senate. The bill for the benefit of Ann Rochester and Francis Rochester, was read the second time, passed and sent to the senate. The bill to incorporate the tow line and canal company between Baltimore and Port Deposit, was read the second time. On motion by Mr. Sewell the following was added to the bill: And be it enacted, that this act shall not go into effect or operation unless the assent of the mayor and city council of Baltimore be first given to it, and unless the written assent of the owner or owners of all the fisheries between the city of Baltimore and Port Deposit be also first obtained by said company. The question was then put shall the said bill pass. Determined in the negative, and the bill returned to the senate.
