

Mr. Barnes delivers the following report:

The committee to whom was referred the memorial of sundry tobacco planters of Frederick county, praying a repeal or modification of the law passed at December session, 1823, entitled, An act to establish state warehouses for the inspection of tobacco, in the city of Baltimore, beg leave to report, That they have had the said memorial under consideration, and are of opinion that it is inexpedient to grant the prayer of the memorialists—they therefore recommend, that they have leave to withdraw their petition

Which was read

On motion by Mr. Barnes, that all be stricken out from the words "that it is," to insert "the prayer of the memorialists is reasonable and ought to be granted; they therefore recommend the passage of an act to repeal the aforesaid act and supplements."

A division of the question was called for by Mr. Duvall, and put on striking out? Determined in the negative

The question was then put, That the house concur with said report? The yeas and nays being required appeared as follow:

So it was resolved in the affirmative.

The bill to limit the number of justices of the peace in the several counties of this state, was read the second time.

Mr. Merrick moved to strike out "two" to insert "one" in the clause giving two justices of the peace for every one thousand of population? Determined in the negative.

Mr. Barnes moved to amend the same so that the number shall not exceed "five justices for each election district."

Mr. Kilgour moved to recommit the bill? Determined in the negative.

Mr. Worthington moved to refer the same to the next general assembly? Determined in the negative.

Mr. Kilgour moved to postpone the further consideration of the same until Monday next? Determined in the negative.

On motion by Mr. Carroll, the house resolved itself into a committee of the whole, to take the said bill into consideration. Mr. John Edelen in the chair After some time spent in discussing the same, the committee rose, and reported the bill with several amendments.

On motion by Mr. M. Mahon, the question was put, That the same be recommitted? Determined in the negative.

Mr. M. Mahon moved to refer the whole to the 1st of June next? Determined in the negative.

On motion by Mr. Lee, Ordered, That the said bill, as amended, be recommitted to an enlarged committee of nine members, with instructions to report a bill that shall be deemed applicable to the wants of the people of the several counties, having regard to population and territory. Ordered, That Messrs. Lee, Worthington, Steele and Merrick, be added to the same.

The clerk of the senate returns the bill for the revaluation of real and personal property in Anne-Arundel county, endorsed "will pass with the proposed amendment;" which amendment was read, assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed. And the bill for the relief of Beal C. Stinchcomb, of the county of Frederick, endorsed "will pass with the proposed amendments;" which amendments were read, assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed.

The bill to incorporate the president and directors of the Baltimore Gunpowder Company, was, according to the order of the day read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Shower obtained leave to bring in a bill, entitled, An additional supplement to the act, entitled, An act for the establishment and regulation of the levy courts in the several counties of this state. Ordered, That Messrs. Shower, Montgomery, Merrick, M. Mahon, Harris, Harcastle, Beckett and Duvall, report the same.

Mr. Millard reports a bill, entitled. An act for the relief of Rosanna Crowl, of Baltimore county.

Mr. Merrick reports a bill, entitled, An act to authorise the levy court of Washington county to levy a sum of money for the purpose of purchasing and providing a farm for the better and more economical support of the poor of Washington county; which was twice read by special order, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Duvall delivers the following report:

The committee on the militia, to whom was referred such part of the governor's message as relates to the operation of a provision in the late supplement to the militia law, requiring that all officers, holding commissions from the executive, should report to the adjutant general, by the 26th day of August last, and that all who omitted to do so, should be by the executive stricken from the rolls, beg leave to report:

That it is with extreme regret they witness a great delinquency of duty on the part of officers in high commission, and entrusted with the execution of laws so important to the character and safety of the state, and not attributing it to a wilful disobedience of the law, which would amount to a shameful dereliction of duty, recommend the suspension of its execution, until the first day of July next. That in the meantime, orders be again issued, through the adjutant general's office, to the commanding officers of divisions, brigades, independent or extra battallions, squadrons and companies, neglecting to make returns, commanding them to report to the adjutant general, under the provisions of said act.

Which was read.

Also a bill, entitled, An act to suspend the execution of the 12th section of the supplement to a militia law, passed February 25, 1824, until the first day of July 1825.
