

As each loan is reimbursable in twenty semi annual payments, the whole of each emission will have been absorbed in fifteen years from the first—but if the wisdom of the legislature will provide for the subsequent distribution of the reimbursement in original loans, and authorize the purchase of the funded debt, in accumulation of a redeeming capital, which will essentially tend to sustain its value; this result might be realized from year to year, and the public interest might be promoted to an extent beyond our most sanguine calculations.

Mr. Gantt obtained leave to bring in a bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act to establish warehouses in the city of Baltimore. Ordered, That Messrs. Gantt, Worthington, Maxcy, Barnes and Duvall, report the same.

Mr. Dennis obtained leave to bring in a bill to be entitled, A supplement to an act to tax certain officers. Ordered, That Messrs. Dennis, Jones and Merrick, report the same.

The supplement to an act, entitled, A further supplement to an act, entitled, An act directing the manner of suing out attachments in this province, and limiting the extent of them, was read the second time, amended, passed, and returned to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Howard, Ordered, That the bill to provide compensation for damages sustained by the owners of houses for the inspection of tobacco in the city of Baltimore, have a second reading on the 26th inst.

Mr. Millard reports a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Amelia Hamilton, of Washington county.

Mr. Beall reports a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of William Clark, of Montgomery county.

Mr. Eccleston reports a bill, entitled, An act to limit the numbers of justices of the peace in the several counties in this state. Ordered, That the same have a second reading on the 24th inst.

Mr. Teackle reports a bill, entitled, An act to alter the time of electing electors to choose a president and vice president of the United States.

Mr. Howard reports a bill, entitled, An act relating to the governor and council of this state.

And Mr. Norris reports a bill, entitled, An act to diminish the expense of judicial proceedings.

Mr. Jarrett presents a petition counter to the petition of the president and directors of the Baltimore and Havre-de-Grace turnpike, praying to be released from finishing said road; referred to the committee on the petition to which it is counter.

Mr. Gantt presents a petition from Ann Smith; and Mr. Estep presents a petition from Mary Westly, praying support; referred to the committee on similar petitions.

The bill for the relief of Sophia Pitt, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Jarrett reports a bill, entitled, "An act regulating the height of fences, and providing for trespasses committed by horses, mules, black cattle, sheep and hogs.

THURSDAY, January 20, 1825.

The house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

Mr. Tyson presents a petition from Fitz King; referred to the committee on insolvencies.

Mr. Thomas obtained leave to bring in a bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act to increase the pay of the judges of the orphans court for the several counties therein mentioned, passed at December session 1817, chapter 216. Ordered, That Messrs. Thomas, Grubb and Henderson, report the same.

Mr. Willson presents a petition from Zachariah Clagett, and others, praying a plot may be received and recorded in Montgomery county court; referred to Messrs. Willson, Merrick, Lee, Eccleston and McMahon.

Mr. Spencer presents a petition from sundry inhabitants of Talbot county, praying the navigation of Kent Narrows may be opened; referred to the committee on the same subject.

Ordered, That the bill supplementary to an act, entitled, An act for the better regulation of the militia of the city of Baltimore, and the additional supplement to an act, entitled, An act for amending and reducing into system the laws and regulations concerning last wills and testaments, &c. have a second reading on Thursday next.

Mr. Worthington reports a bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act to prevent the unlawful exportation of negroes and mulattoes, and alter and to amend the laws concerning runaways.

On motion by Mr. Norris, Ordered, That the bill relative to diminishing expences on judicial proceedings, have a second reading on Wednesday next.

On motion by Mr. Kemp, the following resolution was read the first and second time, by special order, assented to, and sent to the senate.
