WEDNESDAY, February 2, 1825.

The house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. On motion by Mr. Gantt, the following resolution was read:

Resolved, That the governor and council be and they are hereby authorised and required, to examine the claim of James Dooley for cartouch boxes, and if they should be of the opinion that the same is a fair and reasonable claim against the state, to allow the same or so much thereof as they may think right, and they are hereby authorised and empowered to draw upon the treasurer of the western shore, in favour of the said James Dooley, for such sum as they may allow: Provided, That the said James Dooley shall enter into bond to the state for the return of such cartouch boxes as shall be paid for by virtue of this resolution.

The bill for the benefit of the heirs of Patrick Kennedy, late of Cecil county, deceased, was read the second time by special order, passed, and sent to the senate

Mr. Worthington presents a memorial from the trustees of the Franklin Academy, praying time to be heard in answer to the petition of Isaac Vanbibber and others

Mr. Tingle presents a petition from sundry inhabitants of Worcester county, praying that wilful trespasses, in cutting down timber trees, may be made by law criminal offences; referred to Messrs. Tingle, Merrick and Chapman.

Mr Tyson presents a petition from sundry citizens of Baltimore, praying for a law to unite Pleasant and Hillen-streets; referred to Messrs. Tyson, Howard and Worthington. Also a petition from Samuel Davis of Baltimore county; referred to the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims.

Ordered, That the bill supplementary to an act to incorporate the trustees of the Franklin Academy, or School, in Baltimore county, have a second reading on the 8th inst.

The amendments to the bill to repeal the 12th and 13th sections of an act for the relief of the poor of Worcester county, passed at December session 1821, were read the second time, assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed
