The committee on pensions and revolutionary claims, to whom was referred the petition of Geier Gebhart, of Allegany county, have had the same under consideration, and beg leave to report, That they are of opinion that he is not entitled to a pension, he having, as it appears by a resolution number thirty one, of the legislature, passed December session eighteen hundred and fifteen, received the sum of two hundred dollars in full compensation for those services which he rendered during the revolutionary war; they therefore recommend that he have leave to withdraw his petition.

Mr. M-Mahon presents a petition from sundry citizens of the town of Cumberland, praying a repeal of the acts incorporating the said town; referred to Messrs. M-Mahon, Hoffman and Lantz.

Mr. Tyson reports a bill, entitled, An act to abolish the imprisonment of females for debt. On motion by Mr. Millard, Ordered, That the same have a second reading on the 8th inst.

On motion by Mr. M-Mahon, the question was put. That leave be given to bring in a bill, entitled, An act to alter and change all such parts of the constitution and form of government as relate to the election of delegates from the city of Annapolis? The yeas and nays being required appeared as follow:

The house proceeded to the second reading of the bill, entitled, An act to repeal an act to regulate lotteries, passed at December session 1817, with the several supplements thereto, and the question put, Shall the said bill pass? Determined in the negative.

Mr. Lee obtained leave to bring in a bill, entitled, An act respecting the transaction of business on the equity side of Montgomery county court. Ordered, That Messrs. Lee, Beall and Lansdale, report the same.

Mr. Lee reports said bill; which was twice read by special order and passed.

Mr. Tyson reports a bill, entitled, An act to change the name of Louisa Decoutres, to that of Louisa Jacob, and to enable her to inherit the estate of the said Jacob.

Mr. Howard presents a petition from the Orphaline Charity School of the city of Baltimore; referred to Messrs. Howard, Tyson, Worthington, Shower and Price. Mr. Wright delivers the following report:

The committee to whom was referred the petition of sundry inhabitants of Queen Anne's and Caroline counties, praying for a change in the direction of the roads therein mentioned, which are county lines, have had the same under consideration, and after a full investigation thereof have come to the conclusion, that it is inexpedient to legislate thereon, and therefore, that the petitioners have leave to withdraw the same.

The clerk of the senate returns the bill for the benefit of the devisees of George Poe, deceased, endorsed 'will pass with the proposed amendments,' which amendments were read, assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed. Also the bill to prohibit the transportation of absconding slaves to Hayti, or elsewhere; the bill to repeal all such parts of the constitution and form of government as relate to the division of Frederick county into eleven election districts, and for other purposes; the bill to authorize the orphans court of Frederick county to open and review the account of the executors of Philip Juda, late of Frederick county, deceased, and to correct any error which may have been made in the settlement of the said account; and the bill incorporating a company to make a turnpike road from the city of Frederick to Harpers Ferry, severally endorsed 'will pass.' Ordered to be engrossed. And the bill relating to the trustees of the poor of the several counties in this state, endorsed, 'will pass with the proposed amendments; which amendments were read, assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed. And a bill, entitled, An act relating to insolvent debtors, endorsed 'will pass;' which was read.

Mr. Peach obtained leave to bring in a bill, entitled, An act to abolish the practice now in use in the courts of common law and chancery within this state, of approving and receiving bonds upon the faith of magistrates, and other persons' certificates to their sufficiency. Ordered, That Messrs. Peach, Chapman and Tingle, report the same.

Mr. Barnes reports a bill entitled, An act to enable purchasers to obtain possession of lands and premises sold by sheriffs, coroners and elisors, at public auction.

Mr. Barnes reports a bill, entitled, An act to enable the mayor and city council of Frederick to receive
