The feregoing estimates are formed upon the supposition that all the revenue acts, now in force, will be continued. Should it be deemed expedient to confirm them, there will be annually a considerable surplus in the treasury—provided the expenses of the state be not increased, which may be applied either to the purpose of increasing the capital of the state to an amount equal to vesal a way previous to the late war, or to the purpose of internal improvement and the promotion of education. Should the legislature maskey decide that is is inexpedient in this time of general pecuniary pressure, to continue the full amount of the present taxes for the equiposes, your committee are of opinion that the revenue, according to the state from the impection of tobacco may be relinquished, and that the deeper tax may be diminished thirty three sind one third per cent.

It is equally the dictate of a street and sound policy, that the revenue, which is applied to the benefit of all, should be derived from all. If we apply this test to the law imposing a duty upon the inspection of tobacco, we shall find that it is partial in its operations and brings into the treatury, for the general benefit, a large sum of money, which is paid by the citizens of those counties any, where tobacco is entitied. Your committee have therefore felt it to be vight and proper, that this source of resenue, for general supports to should be given up, and that to far as the tax is retained, the proceeds of it, should be applied to the benefit of those who p, y it.
