

The bill for the relief of Eli Rensch, of Washington county, and the bill to confirm to the Vestry of Port Tobacco Parish, and their successors, the right to a lot of land therein mentioned, were passed and sent to the senate. The report on the petitions of William Cockey, John Leatherwood, and Fitz King, was read the second time, and concurred with.

The bill to divorce Christina Kiper; the bill to divorce Mary M. Daniel, were severally read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

The bill authorising commissioners of the tax for Allegany county to value and assess certain lands in cases therein mentioned, and the bill to divorce Caroline R. Elvins, of Baltimore county, were read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

The report on public instruction was read the second time, the resolution assented to, and sent to the senate.

The bill for the relief of Elizabeth Blakely; the bill for the relief of Hannah Bondet; and the bill for the relief of Samuel Grove, of Washington county, were severally read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

The bill to form certain rifle companies into a regiment, was read the second time, passed, and returned to the senate.

The bill to record a deed from Stephen Varlow to Henry L. Davis, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

The clerk of the senate returns the resolution in favour of Matthew Moore, endorsed 'assented to.' The resolution relative to recording certain chancery papers, endorsed 'assented to with the proposed amendment;' which amendment was read and dissented from. The bill to appoint commissioners to review the fourth election district in Baltimore county, and establish the proper place of holding all future elections, endorsed 'will pass.' Ordered to be engrossed. And delivers a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of the Jews in Maryland, endorsed 'will pass;' which was read.

The bill authorising the appointment of bailiffs for Rockville in Montgomery county, and Leonard Town in Saint-Mary's county, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Beckett delivers a report from the commissioners of the school fund of Calvert county.

Mr. Millard reports a bill, entitled, An act to pay the civil list and other expenses of civil government. The bill for the relief of Thomas Willson and Jacob Ayres, and the bill for the relief of Sellick Osborn, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Worthington reports the bill for the relief of sundry poor persons in the several counties in this state, as amended; which was twice read by special order, passed, and sent to the senate.

The reports on the petitions of R. B. Beall, Ruben D. Tucker, and Archibald Dougherty, were severally read and concurred with.

Mr. Worthington delivers the following report:

The committee to whom was referred the petition of Pharably Nicholson of Somerset county, have had the same under consideration, and are of opinion that the prayer of the petitioner should not be granted, they therefore recommend she have leave to withdraw her petition.

The report relative to the bed of the Great Falls of Gunpowder, was read the second time and concurred with.

The further supplement to the act to incorporate a company to make a turnpike road from the city of Baltimore to Havre De-Grace, and the bill to change the place of holding elections in the third election district of Caroline county, were referred to the next general assembly.

The house adjourns until to-morrow morning 9 o'clock.

SATURDAY, February 26, 1825.

The house met. Present the same members as on yesterday, except Mr. Lee.

On motion by Mr. Merrick, Ordered, That the house now proceed to act upon the bill to provide for the payment of the civil list, the act to make permanent and continue in force certain acts of assembly; and the bills from the senate, in the order of date, before the general bills of this house are acted on.

The bill to pay the civil list and other expenses of civil government, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

The bill to make permanent and continue certain acts of assembly therein mentioned, was read the second time.

On motion by Mr. Carroll, the question was put, That the following be added to the bill.

"A supplement to the act, entitled, An act for establishing and securing the salary of the chancellor, passed November session 1797, chapter 85, be and the same is hereby enacted during the continuance of the chancellors commission?" Determined in the negative.

The bill was then passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Thomas obtained leave to bring in a bill to make valid the acts of Johnson Simpser, a justice of the peace in Cecil county. Ordered, That Messrs. Thomas, Henderson and Grubb, report the same.

Mr. Thomas reports said bill. Which was twice read, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Speed obtained leave to bring in a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Mary Ann Patterson. Ordered, That Messrs. Speed, Worthington and Jarret, report the same.

The bill relating to the banks in this state, was read the second time.

On motion by Mr. Ireland, the following was added

Sec. 2. And be it enacted, That each and every of the said institutions, shall be and they are hereby required to receive the respective certificates of money deposited in their respective banks, in payment of debts due to the said banks, whether before or after judgment, and the sheriffs of the several counties of this state shall be and they are hereby required, to receive such certificates in payment of all executions and judgments obtained by such banks.

The bill was then passed and returned to the senate.

The clerk of the senate returns the bill to divorce Christina Kiper; the bill to divorce Caroline B. Elvins, and the bill to divorce Mary M. Daniel, severally endorsed 'will pass.'
