The house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

John T. H. Worthington, esquire, a delegate returned for Baltimore

county, appeared, qualified, and took his seat.

The speaker laid before the house, a communication from the treasurer of the western shore, relative to the school fund; referred to Messrs. Maxcy, Davall, Edelen, Potter and Harris. Also an account current of funded stock as trustee; also relative to the sinking fund for the reimbursement of the Maryland Penitentiary five per cent stock, and the Maryland University five per cent stock; severally referred to the committee of ways and means.

Mr. Ennalls presents a petition from John T. Shanks, of Dorchester county, praying for a divorce; referred to the standing committee on

that subject.

The speaker appointed Messrs. Teackle, Brooke, M'Culloh, Goldsborough, Duvall, Ennalls, and S. R. Smith, to be the committee, to take into consideration the order proposed by Mr. Teackle, relative to a plan
