

We are assured that the petitioners will be satisfied with a donation of three hundred dollars, and as this legislature has, in the donation granted to academies in Worcester county, given two hundred dollars to said Salisbury academy, the committee therefore beg leave to recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the treasurer of the western shore, pay to the trustees of the Salisbury academy, in Worcester county, or to their order, out of any unappropriated money in the treasury, the sum of one hundred dollars, on or before the first day of June next, and on or before the first day of June annually thereafter, in addition to the two hundred dollars granted them by a resolution passed the twenty-seventh day of January last.
