

On motion by Mr. Howard, that the following be inserted in lieu of the words stricken out: 'and the governor shall, by and with the advice and consent of the senate, appoint the officers now appointed by the legislature, or either branch thereof.'

Mr. Eccleston moved to add "except the treasurers, and the officers respectively attached to each branch of the said general assembly." Resolved in the affirmative.

The question was then put on the amendment as amended. Determined in the negative.

Mr. Speed moved the following as an additional section:

And be it further enacted, That the salary of the governor, after an election shall have taken place under the provisions of this act, shall be five thousand dollars, per annum.

Determined in the negative.

On motion by Mr. Duvall, the title was amended by inserting "and to abolish the council," after the word "people."

The question was then put, Shall the said bill pass?
