Mr. Gantt reports a bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act to incorporate the Savage Manufacturing Company.

Mr. Kilgour reports a bill, entitled, An act to authorise and empower the justices of the levy court of Saint-Mary's county to fix and regulate the rates of public inns.

On motion by Mr. Gilpin, Ordered, That a committee be appointed to class and arrange the bills now before this house into public and local bills, and that lists thereof be printed for the use of members. The speaker appointed Messrs. Gilpin, Howard, Edeken, Eccleston and A. E. Jones, to be the said committee.

The report of the committee relative to an arsenal, was read the second time. Mr. Barnes moved to insert the words "authorising the governor and council to dispose of said ammunition and of," before the word state arsenal. Resolved in the affirmative.

Mr. Williams moved that the same lie on the table. Determined in the negative.

Mr. Williams moved to strike out all the rest of the report, relative to the building of an arsenal. Resolved in the affirmative.

Mr. Barnes moved to add to his amendment the words "repairing the barracks at Frederick Town for the safe keeping of the public arms."

Mr. Williams moved the following as a substitute for Mr. Barnes' amendment, "and to dispose, at public or private sale, of the barracks and state property at Frederick Town." Determined in the negative.

Mr. Worthington moved to refer the whole to the 1st of June. Determined in the negative.

On motion by Mr. Barnes, the question was put, That the resolutions be stricken out for the purpose of inserting the following:

'Resolved, That the governor and council be and they are hereby authorised and required, to dispose of, on the most advantageous terms, the whole of the gunpowder belonging to the state.' Resolved in the affirmative, and the resolution sent to the senate.

The resolution in favour of captain William Lewis was read the second time, amended, assented to, and sent to the senate.

On motion by Mr. Tyson, Ordered, That the bill, entitled, An act concerning agents and factors, be made the order of the day for Saturday the 25th of February.

On motion by Mr. Potter, Ordered, That the bill relative to four delegates from each county, be the order of the day for Friday the 24th inst.
