COLORED MEN OF AFFLUENCE.

Wonderful Progress Made by the Colored Race in Ten Years.

The facts are, the colored race has been making enormous strides in the way of money getting during the past ten years. Why, in the City of Washington today, a city in which the Emancipation of 23 years ago found less than a dozen free blacks, there are 104 colored men who pay taxes on above \$25,000 each.

The present Tax Collector of the District of Columbia, himself a colored man, pays taxes on \$250,000. New York had a colored drugist who died recently leaving \$100,000, and a son-in-law worth \$150,000.

Cincinnati has a colored furniture dealer whose check is good any day for \$100,000. Twenty-three years ago he was a Kentucky slave.

A novel application of a recent scientific discovery has been tried before the Orphan's Court by Dr. Persifer Frazer. Some questions upon checks and charges upon partnership accounts were in connection with which it was necessary to settle the validity of some signatures.
