Our Washington Letter.

From our regular correspondent

Washington, Mar. 16 1888

Washington has been an isolated city since Monday last and is only now in limited communication with the rest of the world. The blockade was partially raised on Wednesday, and to-day most of the people bound up in this city from the North and South have departed towards their

destinations. While all telegraphic communication with the outside world was cut off and the blizzard was raging as it seldom has before around the National Capital. this city thought itself the storm center, singled out as a target for the special wrath of Boreas. But a comparison of notes with the various cities assaulted by the storm king and especially with New York where well to do people froze on their way botween their homes and their business made Washingtonians feel that his antics in this neighborhood were gentle and lamb-like, notwithstanding the fact that he tore great trees up by the roots and turned horses and wagons upside down.


