Public Local Law.
CHAPTER 394.
AN ACT to prohibit the use of any in-
strument in taking and catching
Oysters in waters of Talbot, Queen
Anne's, Anne Arundel and Dorchester
counties reserved for the
exclusive use of tugsmen otherwise
than ordinary rakes and tongs.
Section 1. Be it enacted by the General
Assembly of Maryland, That it shall
be unlawful for any person or persons to
use or employ any net or seine, licensed
to take Oysters with rakes or tongs in wa-
ters of Talbot, Queen Anne's, Anne Arundel
and Dorchester counties in taking or
catching Oysters with any implement or
device other than ordinary rakes or tongs
with wooden shafts to be used entirely by
hand, and without any ropes or hoisting
gear whatever.
Sec. 2. And be it enacted, That any per-
son violating the provisions of this Act
shall be liable to the penalties prescribed
in the General Oyster laws of this State
for taking Oysters with rakes and tongs
without license.
Sec. 3. And be it enacted, That this Act
shall take effect from the date of its pas-
sage.

PUBLIC LOCAL LAW.
TO ISSUE BONDS FOR WATER
WORKS FOR THE TOWN
OF CENTREVILLE.
CHAPTER 288.
AN ACT to Authorize the Commis-
sioners of Centreville to issue Bonds
to an amount not exceeding Twenty
Thousand Dollars for the purpose
of Erecting, Building, Working,
Running, Maintaining and Keeping
in Repair Water Works in the
Town of Centreville, Queen Anne's
County, Maryland.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General
Assembly of Maryland, That the Commis-
sioners of Centreville be and they are here-
by authorized and empowered to issue
bonds in the name of the Commissioners
of Centreville, not exceeding in the
whole the sum of twenty thousand dollars,
bearing interest at the rate of not more than
six per centum per annum, payable semi-
annually in each and every year and dated
on the day of their issue, and the same shall
be exempt from county and municipal tax-
ation.
SECTION 2. And be it enacted, That the
said bonds shall be issued in the sum of sev-
enteen years from the date thereof and re-
deemable at any time after the expira-
tion of ten years from the date thereof,
at the option of the holders of the same, and
the said bonds shall be consecutively num-
bered as the same shall be issued.
SECTION 3. And be it enacted, That the
said bonds shall be issued in the sum of sev-
