PREPARING PIGS FOR THE SOUTHERN MARKETS.

A Mammoth Packing House In Kansas City—How Bacon Is Made by the Ton.

"Six thousand five hundred killed, dressed and packed every day in the year" is the rather startling annouce-ment made by the manager of the Kansas City packing house of Armour & Co., as the visitor enters the immease four story buildings which cover more than an acre

buildings which cover more than an acre of ground and contain 1800 employes.

Let us follow, if you please, one of the pigs through this great house. Briven dith a beh with sweetal jundred of his controlles he is setted by the leg and a maching brits him into the sir squealing and gruntling. His own weight carries him, thus suspended by one leg, down an inclined plane to the butchering pit. Here he is caught by the ears, and with one destrons thrust of an immente knife, the 'sticker' puts an end to his hogship's life. The animals are killed at the rate of 650 an hour—a little more than ten a minute. The blood falls ir to a nuge trough and is carried out to another room where it is utilized to make 'Siverwurst,' 'poudhans' and 'blood-maddien' dishes deer to the palate of "siverwurst," "poudhans" and "blood-pudding," dishes dear to the palate of
