**Public Local Law.**  
CHAPTER 304.  
AN ACT TO prohibit the use of any instrument in taking and catching Oysters in waters of Talbot, Queen Anne's, Anne Arundel and Dorchester counties reserved for the exclusive use of tinnmen otherwise than ordinary rakes and tongs.  
Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to use or employ any boat or canoe licensed to take Oysters with rakes or tongs in waters of Talbot, Queen Anne's, Anne Arundel and Dorchester counties in taking or catching Oysters with any implement or device other than ordinary rakes or tongs with wooden shafts to be used entirely by hand, and without any ropes or hoisting gear whatever.  
Sec. 2. And be it enacted, That any person violating the provisions of this Act shall be liable to the penalties prescribed in the General Oyster laws of this State for taking Oysters with rakes and tongs without license.  
Sec. 3. And be it enacted, That this Act shall take effect from the date of its passage.

**PUBLIC LOCAL LAW.**  
TO ISSUE BONDS FOR WATER WORKS FOR THE TOWN OF CENTREVILLE.  
CHAPTER 288.  
AN ACT to authorize the Commissioners of Centreville to issue Bonds to an amount not exceeding Twenty Thousand Dollars for the purpose of Erecting, Building, Working, Running, Maintaining and Keeping in Repair Water Works in the Town of Centreville, Queen Anne's County, Maryland.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the Commissioners of Centreville be and they are hereby authorized and empowered to issue Bonds in the name of the Commissioners of Centreville, in sums not less than one hundred dollars nor more than one thousand dollars, to be signed by the Commissioners of Centreville, and to be made in any amount not exceeding the sum of twenty thousand dollars, bearing interest at the rate of not more than five per centum per annum, payable semi-annually in each and every year and dated on the day of their issue, and the same shall exempt from county and municipal taxation.

SECTION 2. And be it enacted, That the said Bonds shall be issued, payable seven years from the date thereof and interest thereon at any time after the expiration of ten years from the date thereof, at the pleasure of said Commissioners, and the said Bonds shall be consecutively numbered and the same shall be issued.

SECTION 3. And be it enacted, That the said sum of twenty thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary for the purpose, shall be, by the said Commissioners of Centreville used and applied exclusively to the payment of the costs and expenses of erecting, building, working, running, maintaining and keeping in repair Water Works and the plant for the same of the town of Centreville, at the said Commissioners may order and direct.

SECTION 4. And be it enacted, That the said Commissioners of Centreville be and they are required in each and every year to levy and collect a special tax, not exceeding ten cents on every one hundred dollars worth of taxable property of all kinds and description within the corporate limits of the town of Centreville, to pay the interest on the outstanding bonds by them issued under the provisions of this act as the same shall fall due, and to gradually redeem and retire such bonds until they shall all have been redeemed and retired, and the proceeds of such tax shall be collected by the said Commissioners, and forthwith by them applied to the redemption of said bonds, when and as soon as they shall become redeemable, and the said taxes are hereby lawfully levied and collected for the purpose of the interest and principal of said bonds, and the said Commissioners may cause an assessment or valuation of all property of all kinds and description within the corporate limits of said town, to be made between the first day of April and the first day of May in each and every year, for the purpose of ratifying the provisions of this act, and any person feeling himself aggrieved by an assessment or valuation of his property as assessed or valued for the purpose of this act may appeal to the Circuit Court for Queen Anne's County at any time within thirty days after his appeal has been filed in writing of assessment or valuation.

SECTION 5. And be it enacted, That the Commissioners of Centreville be and they are hereby authorized and empowered to take sense of the people of the said town of Centreville in relation to the issuing of the bonds provided for in this act, by submitting question to the qualified voters of said town on such day and at such place in said town, and between such hours of the day as the said Commissioners may order, and direct, which submission and election shall be as soon as the said Commissioners may determine after the passage of this act, after giving ten days notice of such submission and election, to be published and printed in the two newspapers of said town of Centreville, and at such election the qualified voters of said town shall be authorized to cast a ballot "For Water Works, or a ballot "Against Water Works, and the result of such election shall be certified by the Judges thereof, to the Commissioners of Centreville, and if the majority of the votes cast be for Water Works, the said Commissioners of Centreville shall be empowered to exercise the authority vested in them by the provisions of this act, and the cost and expense of said election shall be paid by the town of Centreville; and the qualified voters of said town shall be construed to mean those who are entitled to vote under Section thirty-two, Chapter one hundred and eighteen of the laws of the State of Maryland.

SECTION 6. And be it enacted, That the Commissioners of Centreville, be and they are authorized to execute the authority vested in them by the provisions of this act, and to employ and negotiate, sell or dispose of said bonds, or as many thereof as they shall deem proper, and with the proceeds thereof to erect, or provide for the erection or provide for the erection building, working, running, maintaining, and keeping in repair of said Water Works, and they are further fully authorized to make all necessary rules and regulations and to pass all necessary ordinances with penalties for the violation and to do all other necessary acts for their proper managing, maintaining, running, and repairing of said Water Works, and for the proper protection and security thereof.

SECTION 7. And be it enacted, That this act shall take effect from the date of its passage.
