The Congressional Convention of this district was called to order in the Town Hall at Denton, on Friday at 12 m., by Luther W. Gadd, Chairman of the State Central Committee of Caroline county.

Mr. W. B. Stevens of Caroline presented the name of Mr. M. S. Matchler of Carroll in a very forcible speech; seconded by E. E. Goslin, in a strong and appropriate speech.

Mr. Orman Hammond, of Talbot county, presented the Hon. C. H. Gibson, a most eloquent speech and was very appropriately seconded by W. E. Temple of this county.

PUBLIC LOCAL LAW

To Extend Boundaries of Centerville

AN ACT to extend the boundaries of Centerville, Queen Anne's County, and to re-enact the same with amendments.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That Sections 31 and 34 of Article 17, of the Code of Public Local Laws, relating to the town of Centerville, Queen Anne's County, be and the same are hereby repealed and re-enacted so as to read as follows:

SECTION 2. The bounds and limits of the town of Centerville may be, by the Commissioners of Centerville, from time to time enlarged and extended to take in and incorporate with said town portions of the circumjacent territory, and the bounds and limits of said town as enlarged and extended shall meet the requirements of the growth and expansion thereof in the judgment and discretion of said Commissioners.

SECTION 3. The bounds and limits of the town of Centerville may be, by the Commissioners of Centerville, from time to time enlarged and extended to take in and incorporate with said town portions of the circumjacent territory, and the bounds and limits of said town as enlarged and extended shall meet the requirements of the growth and expansion thereof in the judgment and discretion of said Commissioners.

SECTION 4. All fines, penalties and forfeitures which may be recovered under the provisions of this article, relating to the town of Centerville, or any ordinance passed in pursuance thereof, may be recovered before a justice of the peace of Queen Anne's County in the name of the Commissioners of Centerville, as small debts are recovered, and applied to the benefit of said town, and the Commissioners of Centerville, or the Justice of the Peace, as judge of nonpayment thereof as soon as adjudged as aforesaid, in addition to process of attachment or execution for the enforcement thereof, shall have power forthwith to commit the offender or offenders to the county jail until the payment of said fine, penalty or forfeiture so as aforesaid adjudged against him or them, together with all costs, unless sooner released and discharged by the order of said Commissioners.

SECTION 5. And it is enacted, That this Act shall take effect from the date of its passage. Approved April 4th, 1888. ELIHU E. JACKSON, Governor.

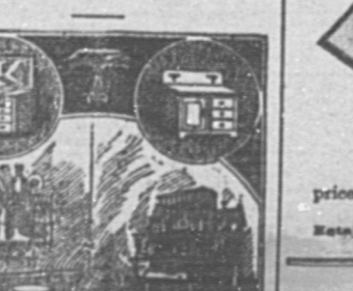
