PUBLIG LOGAL LAW

To Extend Boundarier of Centreville

A Sections 31 and 64 of Article 17, of the Code of Public Local Laws, relating to the town of Centreville, Queen Anne's County, and to re-enact the same with

amendments.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That Sections 31 and 64 of Article 17, of the Code of Public Local Laws, relating to the town of Centreville, Queen Anne's County, be and the same are hereby repealed and re-enacted so as to read as follows:

Section 31. The bounds and limits of the town of Centreville, from time, enlarged and extended so as to take in and and incorporate with said town portions of the circumjacent territory, and the bounds and limits of said town as enlarged and extended to meet the requirements of the growth and expansion thereof in the judgment and discretion of said Commissioners, shall beappropriately marked by stokes or growth and expansion thereof in the judgment and discretion of said Commissioners, shall beappropriately marked by stones or other fixed landmarks, and shall be described in plats and certificates thereof, to be prepared by the County Surveyor, and filed and recorded in the office of the Circk of the Circuit Court for Queen Anne's County, and the said Commissioners of Centreville shall have power to order the condemnation of lands and property for opening, widening, altering and straightening of stress, lanes, alleys and footways within said town limits, and to provide for the payment town limits, and to provide for the payment twen limits, and to provide for the payment thereof in installments of one, two or three years, in their discretion, by special tax, to be levied for the purpose; the exercised of the right of condemnation to beexercised as in cases of opening, widening, altering or straightening public road by the County county Commissioners, with right of appeal also as in such cases made and provided.
