Two Kinds of Pneum

Two kinds of Pneumonia.

There are two distinct forms of pneumonia. One of these always follows an attack of broughtis (a cold in the lungs); in this the lung is inflamed in patches or lobules scattered over both lungs alike. This is the form that is so fatal in children and old people. It is termed catarrhal pneumonia. The other, that which attacks adults suddenly often in the wides of appreciate other, that which attacks adults suddenly, often in the midst of apparent health, is called "croupous or lobar pneumonia," because one lobe only of one lung is usually attacked. The last named form is not caused by cold, although the first symptom is a severochill with shivering, which would seem to show that a chilling of the body had really caused the whole trouble. The catarrhal form always follows a catarrh of the bronchial tobes; it is never the first event in a chain of discease, but always secondary. Although there are many plausible reasons for thinking that cold never causea "a cold," there are some facts that seem to prove that a catarrh of the air pas-sages may thus be caused.
