## SUNSTROKES.

THE CAUSES, SYMPTOMS, PRE-VENTION AND CURE.

Preliminary Indications of a Stroke -People Most Likely to Suffer an Attack - How to Treat Sufferers.

A Pittsburg (Penn.) doctorsays in the Commercial Gazette of that city: An attack of sunstroke is nearly always proceeded by certain symptoms which should direct the individual's attention to the direct the individual's attention to the impending danger. These symptoms are a hot, dry skin—the perspiration being checked—dryness of the mouth and throat, flushed face, suffusion of the eyes and throbbing of the head. In some cases there is slight delirium, in others a sense of weakness and confusion of thought, with alternate flushing and cooling of the face, such as sometimes comes on after smoking a strong cigar. The pulse is usually rapid, sometimes The pulse is usually rapid, sometimes intermitteat, and if the temperature of the body be measured with the thermometer, it will be found se avail degrees above "blood heat." If no attention if

above "blood heat." If no affeation is paid to these premonitory symptoms and exposure to the exciting cause continue, the "stroke" comes. The person suddenly falls to the ground, becomes unconscious and comatose, or is attacked by frequent convulsions. The breathing is deep, slow and snoring; the pulse very rapid a "d the skin-iry and burning hot. In some cases, however, especially of that variety classed as "heat-stroke," that is to say, where the individual was not directly exposed to the rays of the sun, the pulse is weak and the skin pale, cold and moist. In these cases there is great danger of paralysis of the heat, following extreme exhaustica of the nervous system.

The causes of sunstroke are excessively high temperature, exhausting physical labor, excessive indulgence in alcoholic liquors and deprivation of water. Soldiers on a march in hot weather are very subject to sunstroke, especially when suffering for want of water. In the Federal army, during the late war, there were 7.00 cases of sunstroke, but owing probably to prompt attention from the medical officers the mortality was low. I abovers working in confined spaces, such as stejedores, are frequently prostrated by heat stroke, and a largiportion of these succumb to the attack. Nothing is more firmly and conclusively established in the whole range of medical practice than that intemperance is the most prominent and fatal predisposing cause of sunstroke. A drunken man is not only much more liable to be attacked but he is almost certain to die

1. You are aware that vigorous out

Lessen it below the average of the past, and note whether the tendency to headache lessens with it. If it does you are on the right track. If not, try the effect of more frequent and abundant meals.

4. Constipation fills the blood with poisons that affect the brain. Let this be remedied, if possible, by your food. Abjure white bread, and use bread made from "entire wheat flour," or mush from outmeal or "wheat germ-meal," with a

5. Notice whether any particular article of food positively disagrees with you—in itself, in the mode of cooking it, or in the quantity eaten—and govern yourself accordingly.
