As the berries ripen they become red and dark purple. They are then picked by hand at intervals during the harvest time. To prepare the seeds for market it is necessary to remove, first of all, the outside pulp. This is done by machinery, which cossists of various patterns. Some use an upright cylinder, in which revolves another with teeth, that bruises the berries as they neas through. Running

another with teeth, that bruises the berries as they pass through. Running water washes away the pulp, which is light and rises to the top, while the seeds, being heavy, sink to the bottom and are drawn off.

Next comes the drying process, which is usually contrived in this manner:
There is a large space of bare ground in front of the coilee house, and here the berries are spread out during the day and exposed to the hot sun. At night they are raked up in piles and covered to protect from the dew.
