The Red Cross Society is an organization for the purpose of securing neutrality to the ground occupied by hospitals, etc., during war, and to provide relief from disaster by flood, pestilence or other calamity during peace. The movement had its origin in Europe. The battle of Solferino was fought in 1857, and Henry Dunant, a Swiss gentleman, visited the battle3eld. What he saw of suffering on the field and in the hospitals made a battlefeld. What he saw of suffering on the field and in the hospitals made a lasting impression. He saw that with all the appliances and outfit of the French army, aided by inhabitants where the wounded were taken, the wounded were often laft for days without attention or surgical relief.
