## THE TARIFF LAW AND THE MASSES.

The new tariff law went into operation on Monday, and naturally much anxiety is manifested among merchants and importers as to the result which changes in the schedules will have upon trade. It is felt that a sharp advance in tariff rates upon numerous commodities at once will demoralize trade to some extent, and that months, perhaps, will elapse before prices and profits will regain anything like equilibrium.

This is, without doubt, one serious side of the tariff question. Both foreign and domestic trade are exceedingly sensitive to changed conditions. Each has wonderful recuperative power, and in time will become adjusted to the most conservative influences. But any such changes as those which have now gone into effect necessarily jar the whole machinery of exchange from its accustomed equilibrium. It is felt that the uncertainty of the future will have a tendency to check the flow of trade.

## CONCEALED WEAPONS.

### —ON— ELECTION DAY

The following Act of the General Assembly of Maryland, passed at the January Session of 1874, and approved April 6th, 1874, is also published for the information of the public:

#### AN ACT.

To prevent the carrying of guns, pistols, dirks, dirk-knives, razors, billies, blind-guns, by any person in Kent, Queen Anne's or Montgomery Counties on the day of Election in the said counties.

Sec. 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That from and after the passage of this Act, it shall not be lawful for any person in Kent, Queen Anne's or Montgomery Counties to carry on the day of election, secretly or otherwise, any gun, pistol, dirk, dirk-knife, razor, billy or bludgeon, and any person violating the provisions of this Act shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof before any Justice of the Peace in either of said counties, shall be fined not less than five nor more than twenty dollars, and on refusal to pay said fine, shall be committed by such Justice of the Peace to the jail of the county until the same is paid.

Sec. 2. And be it enacted, That the fines collected under this Act shall be paid by the officer collecting same to the School Commissioners of the county where such offense shall have been committed, for school purposes.

Sec. 3. And be it enacted, That any constable of either of said counties, or the sheriff thereof, who shall refuse to arrest any person violating any provision of this Act, upon information of such offense, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction before the Circuit Court for such county, shall be fined not less than twenty nor more than fifty dollars, and shall be discharged from office.
