"The will of the majority expressed in orderly constitutional methods is the only king to which we bow."

The author of this unexceptionable sentiment is Benjamin Harrison. He uttered it in a speech at Topeka last Friday, and it was received with prolonged cheers.

We wonder if the cheerers or the cheerer remembered that these words of Benjamin Harrison were in reality a blow in the face of his party, which has been engaged all summer and part of the fall in reversing the will of the majority expressed in orderly constitutional methods. The king to which the Republican party bows is not the will of the majority, but the will of Tom Reed.

Gen. Harrison has been urged to call an extra session of the Fifty-first Congress, so that the Force bill may become a law. CONCEALED WEAPONS.

ON ELECTION DAY

The following Act of the General Assembly of Maryland, passed at the January Session of 1874, and approved April 6th, 1874, is also published for the information of the public:

AN ACT To prevent the carrying of guns, pistols, dirks, dirk-knives, razors, bludgeons, bludgeons, by any person in Kent, Queen Anne's or Montgomery Counties on the day of Election in the said counties.

Sec. 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That from and after the passage of this Act, it shall not be lawful for any person in Kent, Queen Anne's or Montgomery counties to carry on the day of election, secretly or otherwise, any gun, pistol, dirk, dirk-knife, razor, billy or bludgeon, and any person violating the provisions of this Act shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof before any Justice of the Peace in either of said counties, shall be fined not less than five nor more than twenty dollars, and on refusal to pay said fine, shall be committed by such Justice of the Peace to the jail of the county until the same is paid.

Sec. 2. And be it enacted, That the fines collected under this Act shall be paid by the officer collecting same to the School Commissioners of the county where such offense shall have been committed, for school purposes.

Sec. 3. And be it enacted, That any constable of either of said counties, or the sheriff thereof, who shall refuse to arrest any person violating any provision of this Act, upon information of such offense, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction before the Circuit Court for such county, shall be fined not less than twenty nor more than fifty dollars, and shall be discharged from office.
