...valued altogether.
...It is perfectly true that no system
...of valuation can be devised which will
...altogether remedy this evil; for our
...property is so widely and so variously
...distributed, and so much of it is in
...the hands of persons who are by a few
...degrees of their own wealth. But we
...can devise a system of valuation
...which will ascertain approxi-
...mately the amount of personal prop-
...erty owned by each individual, and
...levy in this State and in the States
...without exciting hostility to our meth-
...od of doing so.
...The subject was generally dis-
...cussed in this State in the summer and
...autumn of 1891, and all parties were
...agreed as to the necessity of a new act
...for the assessment of property in
...this State. You are aware that a bill
...for this purpose was passed by the
...House of Delegates, almost unani-
...mously, at the session of January,
...1892, after considerable debate. It
...was not acceptable to the Senate. That
...body brought forward and adopted a
...very different and far more stringent
...bill. When this Senate bill was pre-
...sented to the House it was, for some
...reason, not fully discussed or debated.
...The exigency of other business and
...the unwillingness of the House to ad-
...journ without passing an assessment
...bill probably incited that body to de-
...fer to the judgment of the Senate, and
...it therefore passed the Senate bill.
...It became at once apparent that
...the bill, thus passed, whatever may
...have been its actual merits, was not
...satisfactory to the people of this State.
...This was made apparent to me by the
...protests of men of all opinions and of
...widely different interests. The meth-
...ods of the bill were bitterly com-
...plained of. It was evident to me that
...if it would, if approved, create a feeling
...of widespread discontent and prejudice
...unfavorable to the growth of the State,
...and to the increase of its prosperity.
...Unfortunately the rejection of the
...third constitutional amendment at the
...elections held in the autumn of 1891
...made the constitutionality of the act
...limiting the assessable values of cer-
...tain descriptions of personal prop-
...erty, which was intended to be supple-
...mentary to the proposed assessment
...bill, extremely doubtful.

...Under those circumstances I deemed
...it to be my duty to withhold my
...approval from the proposed assessment
...bill and from the auxiliary bill re-
...ferred to, and await your further ac-
...tion in the matter.
...My veto of the particular measures
...probably impose upon me the duty of
...making some particular recommenda-
...tion to the next General Assembly
...upon the subject of a new assessment
...law, which it is unquestionably for
...the reasons I have given, and for many
...others, the duty of the next General
...Assembly to enact. I am unwilling
...to undertake this task without feeling
...that I am when doing it in touch with
...the deliberate and well-founded opini-
...ons of all classes of the people of this
...State. No method occurs to me better
...adapted to afford this assurance than
...the convocation by me of a limited
...number of thoroughly representative
...men from each county of the State and
...from the City of Baltimore to consider
...in open discussion in the winter of this
...year at some convenient place in Bal-
...timore City the proper details of such
...a measure. Delegates from the lead-
...ing agricultural, commercial, manu-
...facturing and other industrial organi-
...zations ought to form a part of such
...a advisory body.
