Disunion would generate the centralism of military despotism in the separate States; centralism attempted on areas and populations so vast would break the parts asunder, and fill our continent, as it has filled every other, with rival nations.

Our wise ancestors devised the only system possible to avoid these opposite evils. They formed a Federal Government to manage our foreign relations, to maintain peace and unity between the States, and to administer a few exceptional functions of common interest; and they left the great residuary mass of governmental powers to the States.

The creed of the Democratic party is comprised in two ideas: First, to limit as much as possible all governmental power, enlarging always and everywhere the domain of individual judgment and action; secondly, to throw back the governmental powers necessary to be exercised as much as possible upon the States and the localities, approaching in every case the individuals to be affected.

These ideas dominate over the Democratic party, and find in their best representative. The opposite ideas, to meddle with everything properly belonging to the individual, and to centralize all governmental powers, are the tendencies of the Republican party.

Under the inspiration the Federal Government is rapidly seizing upon all the powers of human society. It has assumed to regulate the suffrage and threatens to take the control of all elections.

Household

Persons with weak digestion not eat apples and beans together, says a compiler of a well-known cook book.

Raspberries vinegar may be easily made by this recipe: To four pounds of crushed raspberries add half a pint of pure wine vinegar and let them stand for twenty-four hours. At the end of this time pour off the clear juice and put it on the fire with two pounds of sugar. When it boils remove the scum and let the syrup stand over night. Next morning put it in bottles and seal well.

No person should go longer than a week without bathing the entire body. Some persons make it a rule to take a bath every day, which is better, but the great majority of mankind cannot make it convenient to do so. We believe that fever could be prevented nearly altogether by proper bathing and correct diet. Every family, hotel and boarding house should have bathing facilities of some kind.

To REMOVE RUST--To remove rust from steel cover with sweet oil well rubbed on; in forty-eight hours use unslacked lime powdered very fine. Rub it till the rust disappears. To prevent rust, mix with fat oil varnish four-fifths of well-refined spirits of turpentine. Articles varnished in this manner will retain their brilliancy, and never contract any spots of rust. It may be applied to copper philosophical instruments, etc.

For this way of cooking white summer squashes: Cut three summer squashes in quarters and put them in boiling water slightly salted, enough to cover them; boil gently for forty-five minutes. After putting the squashes in the water add one sprig of parsley, four pepper corns, two cloves and a minced onion. When the squashes are cooked pass them through a sieve and put them on the back of the range to keep warm. Mix one teaspoonful of flour in a little cold milk, mix with the squash and serve with cream.

Beefsteak broiled and served with a maitre d'hotel sauce is highly to be recommended. It is also exceedingly nice out in filets and baked au gratin. The fish should be small. Split it in half down the middle and remove the bones and skin. Cut the fish in strips, cover each piece with well-seasoned stuffing and broil together. Cover the broiler with a thin layer of butter and melt it. Pour the melted butter over the fish. Cover the great lakes to the Pacific.
