New York City still follows the antiquated custom of discriminating in salaries against her women school teachers, notes a writer in the Illustrated American. Take, for example, the teachers of the grammar grade. The highest salary for men is \$4200; for women, only \$3116. The lowest salary a man may receive is \$1080, while the minimum for women is \$770. The salaries of primary teachers, all women, range from \$430 to \$235. This average of salaries of the men's teachers in the city is \$2900, and that of the women's only \$921, less than one-half. Should a woman attain the office of principal her maximum salary is \$2900, and that only after a forty-year career. Three-fourths of the male principals are receiving the maximum salary of \$3900.
