One thousand tous are alcaly being shipped to New York for transshipment on the arst vessel leaving for Havana, and the remainder of the amount will be forwarded as soon as it can be manufac-

The wire will make a continuous tine 610 miles long, and will be stretched on poles on the onter bank deep and wide ditch.
