Sometime since we were called upon to notice an editorial of a Bro.'s quill who claimed he lived in a town of "moral atmosphere." 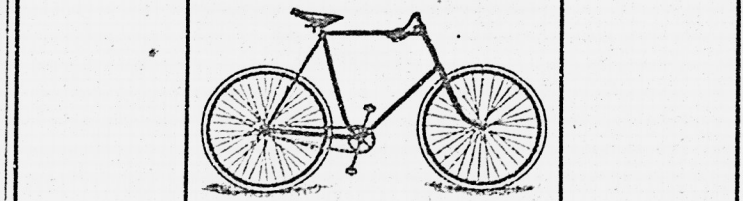

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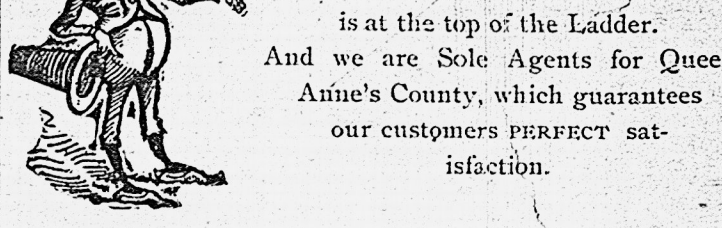
