WASHINGTON, May 24, 1897:-Speaker Reed is the man who con-trols the fate of the Senate resolution declaring for the recognition of Cuban belligerency, and there is no reason for anybody entertaining any doubt as to his attitude towards that resolution. If President McKinley should conclude that a recognition of belligerency would be preferable to the policy he has mapped out for himself and should desire to have that resolution adopted by the House, he has only to say so and Speaker Reed will promptly put the resolu-tion through, but so long as the President remains of the opinion that a recognition of belligerency will not satisfactorily meet the exigencies of the case, that resolution will remain just where it is—on the Speaker's table. There is much talk about a revolt on the part of the House, and the adoption of that resolution in spite of the Speaker, but it is only talk. Enough republicans in the House will stand by the Speaker body, and that, too, in the face of the Governor. fact that probably seven-tenths of them are in favor of the belligerency resolution. No such thing as a "vote of confidence" is known in American legislative proceedings, but President McKinley in saying that the adoption of that resolution at this time would embarass him in carrying out his Cuban policy, has practically asked his party in the House for a vote of fidence, and, although there is no politics in this question, his party is likely to do as he wishes, at least long enough for him to have the chance to make his policy known.
