Under the head of "The Mote and the Bean," the Baltimore Evening News of July 6, has the following:

"THE QUEENSTOWN NEWS of last Saturday, commenting upon the dissatisfaction at the outcome of the judicial and county Democratic convention, boldly announces that the only hope of securing the usual Democratic majority in the county lies in the liberal use of money. The menace of a heavy illiterate negro vote, kept in hand by selfish and unprincipled men, and the debasement of voters by the use of money, so extensively practiced in Maryland under the Gorman regime, are equally threatening evils, and the honesty and intelligence of the State must be roused to reduce them to the minimum."

The Republicans held a meeting in Centerville on Tuesday. It was a mixture of "Chocolate Drops" and "Lily Whites." They deferred making a ticket until later on. We presume they are considering if it will pay to nominate a county ticket. They instructed their delegates to use their influence in trying to secure the nomination of Geo. M. Russin for Chief Judge.

Well, poor old Russin! He has been before the people so often and elected to stay at home, we cannot help feeling sorry for the gentleman. But he will have to continue to receive his medicine, as the disease is liable to come back in a worse form than ever this fall. We hardly thought the Democratic nominee, Mr. Jas. Alfred Pearce, would have such a cinch on his election, but if the Republicans cannot find any stronger candidate than Russin, the election of Pearce is a foregone conclusion, and the next thing is how large the majority will be?

The Prohibitionists held a meeting in Centerville, on Tuesday. And like the republicans failed to name a ticket. We wonder if they are waiting for the republicans to name their ticket with Russin for its head and then throw their strength to the republicans? Russin has been very useful as well as ornamental for the prohibitionists and now is the time to reciprocate.



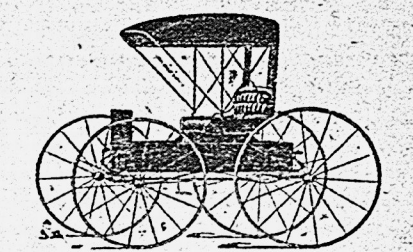
