According to returns from thirty of the largest postoffices, the business of which has been regarded as a trustworthy barometer of the general business conditions of the country, things are getting a decided move on them and the country has crossed the line which separated it from prosperity. The business of these thirty postoffices was eight per cent greater in August 1897, than it was in the same month last year. A comparison of 1897 and 1896 shows, in January, a decrease of 3.5 per cent; in February, a decrease of 4.5 per cent; March, an increase of 2.2 per April, an increase of .5 per cent; May, an increase of .7 per cent; June, an increase of .5 per cent, and July, of 3 per cent. The jump to a clean 8 per cent increase in August is considered something extraordina-
