The festival and oyster supper given by the Independent Order of Mechanics, Wednesday and Thursday nights was a grand success, and the ladies deserves special praise for their excellent services rendered. Last Sunday, two of our citizens were making corn the best part of the day, and one carried his gift down to Jackson's creek to rig his patent pokers. Can't this be stopped or shall it still go on in our civilized country?

One day last week, Capt. Frederick K. Bryan, arrested Jakey Baker for using patent tongs in Eastern Bay. Mr. Baker was carried before Justice Phillips of Kent Island, and held for a hearing on Saturday last, but before the day of trial he was released, and sent word not to appear. Previous to our national campaign our Republican friends advanced the idea that in the election of McKinley, industries would resume work and confidence would be restored and the price of our oysters would advance. Kent has broken up her beds and now Queen Anne's is trying to break up her beds. The day will soon come when these patent tong men will be sorry that they ever saw a patent tong. What can be the matter with the oyster, who left the hole open? May God hasten the day when this law shall be made new, and the patent tongs shall be broken up before it is too late. Our fellow men just stop for a moment and study how many families of Queen Anne's county are making their living by oystering. And these patent tongs are taking bread and meat out of their mouths, yet they cry: "Use them we say, use them," but remember when you break up the oyster beds, don't come to our face and say we help to do it.

Hicks' Weather for October. About the 3d warmer weather will set in and from about that date to the 6th low barometer resulting in storms will past eastward over the country. Between this and the reactionary storms due about the 9th and 10th, a higher barometer and frosty nights will prevail. A cold fall mood look for autumnal storms and prepare for much colder weather for several days thereafter. From about the 15th to the 18th falls another storm period, bringing change to much warmer, falling barometer, and more autumnal storms. After each October storm area passes over your section, look for change to cool with frosts. The 21st and 22d are centers of reactionary disturbances. From 25th to 29th is a storm period; this calls for many hard storms of land and water. A cold wave, with snow north, will follow this period.
